The Checker lacrosse club, that ancient and honorable, great and glorious institution was organized for the coming season with great ceremony and speech making in the parlors of the Ontario hotel, where about 50 enthusiasts gathered for that purpose last Monday night. The officers elected were: Hon. pres., G S Wallis; pres., T J Overend; 1st vice-pres., A Hamilton; 2nd vice-pres., J J Holmes; capt., Sam Weeks; sec., D W Ruthertord; treas., J Ross; com., D M Smith, W Murray, H McKinnon and S Weeks. The outlook was very ably presented in a short speech by Mr D M Smith, who showed what could be done by all pushing together and working to put the Checker lacrosse club once more at the top of the ladder. He reviewed the history of the club and offered to come out and practise with the boys and do his share along with the rest of the boys and at the same time train up the little Smiths to do their duty by the national game. Mr T Overend's speech was also one of encouragement and the enthusiasm manifested by his hearers, if sustained throughout the season, lacrosse ought to boom with a great big boom during 1897. The meeting broke up with the club's yell and cheers for the queen.

Since Beaverton has adopted concrete sidewalks as the walk par excellence we append the following instructions for its construction for the use of those of our readers who may be disposed to lay the same as garden walks: "To lay a concrete walk about 12 inches deep and width desired fill in about seven inches deep with very coarse gravel, and after ramming it down well cover this with sand or fine gravel about one inch deep. This is the foundation for the concrete to rest on. The concrete should be four inches deep and mixed up in the following manner: One measure Rosen-dale cement, 2 1/2 measures clean sharp sand and 5 measures stone and coarse gravel. This is spread on about 1 1/2 inches deep and then rammed down to one half inch. Smooth off the top with a trowel. Cover with sand, grass, or anything to prevent drying too fast, and keep it covered for at least ten days. When making concrete, be very careful not to get too much water. The mass of concrete when ready for use should with repeated light ramming, show a thin film of moisture on surface. If properly mixed with water it will not show a jelly like motion under the rammer. For tar pavement dig out the walk to the depth of four inches. Thoroughly mix coal tar and coarse gravel and fill in about three inches deep, then roll it down with a heavy roller or else ram it. Then make another mixture of fine gravel or sifted coal ashes and tar and spread on a thin coat, cover it with sand and roll or beat it well. This should be well rammed. Before it has had time to set the surface should be scratched so as to hold the top coat. The top coat is made as follows: One part Portland cement and 2 to 2 1/2 parts clean fine sand.—Express.

ORILLIA

Fire limit by-law case
Mr. Justice Street has not handed down his decision yet in the case of Quinn vs. Orillia, an action to upset the fire limit by-law. The case came up at Barrie last week. After Mr. Quinn and Mr. Wm. Dunn had given evidence, His Lordship said that there could be no doubt that the building was a breach of the by-law, and that the decision would hinge upon whether the by-law was valid or not. Mr. Pepler, for Mr. Quinn, argued that the by-law went beyond the powers of the council in requiring partial destroyed buildings to be rebuilt with main walls of brick and stone. He also raised several technical objections to the by-law. Mr. McCosh appeared for the town. There were quite a number of witnesses on both sides, but they were not called upon. Other towns are quite as much interested in the case as Orillia, for an adverse decision would upset most of the fire limit by-laws in the province, and no doubt the gravity of the situation is causing His Lordship to weigh the matter well before giving a decision.
