### Pickering Council.

The above council met in the township hall, Brougham, on Monday, 12th inst. Members all present. Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Communication from Hon. Jno. Dryden. Communication from Municipal World. Mr. Jackson was heard re renting of road allowance.

Geo. Philip was heard re account of Mrs. Geo. Palmer.

Communication from Employee's Guarantee Company.

Communication from A. W. Campbell, provincial road commissioner.

W. J. Taylor was heard re cutting down trees bet lot 28 and 29 in the 2nd con.

Jas Taylor was heard re grant on bonus for wire fence on town line bet 3rd and 4th con.

Communication from Wells & McMurphy re purchasing road allowance, lots 2 and 3, con. 9.

Petition from freehold Loan & Saving Co. for bonus on wire fence on south half of lot 10, con. 5.

Petition presented by F. E. Jones and 12 others re grant of \$100 for graveling sideroad between lots 4 and 5, con. 7.

Petition for a grant of \$50 to be expended on south parts of lot 14 and 15, concession 6, signed by Spencer Taylor and 12 others.

John Kirton was heard asking for privilege of using road allowance on south end of road between lots 30 and 31 in 4th con. for a lane.

Petition to grant a sum of money to gravel and grade road at lots 24 and 25 in 2nd con. signed by Louis Gourlie and 14 others.

Committee on Indigents reported and recommended as follows:—Mrs. McIntyre for keep of Mary Jolly, bal 25c per week for 11 weeks and 3 days, \$2.87; Geo. Philip, two cord of wood to Mrs. Palmer \$6.00.

On motion of Mr. Beare, chairman, report was adopted.

The standing committee on contingencies reported and recommended as follows:—To W. J. Clarke, office blanks, quarantine notices, advertising and 300 copies of road lists, \$19.25; D. R. Beaton on salary, \$40; Jas. Hubbard on account, \$3.00.

Your committee have received a communication from Mr. Campbell Prov road commissioner, that he can come to our township on the 29th inst. This being a busy time we would ask Mr. Campbell to make his visit some time the last of May and the clerk be instructed to communicate with him and ascertain the date.

On motion of Mr. Barnes, chairman, report was adopted.

Standing committee on roads and bridges reported and recommended as follows:—Kinsale road, \$25; A. E. Howlett, breaking 3 tons of stone on Kings road in Dunbarton, \$21.25; John Percy, supplying 5113 feet of plank and conveying at \$12 per M, balance in full of account, \$31.25; George Litton, filling washouts in road division No. 47, \$1; W. M. Mitchell, filling washout on 3rd con, opposite lot 22, \$4.

Your committee would recommend that petition received from F. E. Jones and 12 others asking for the sum of \$100 to gravel sideroad between lot 4 and 5, rear of 7th con, be laid over till the next regular meeting of this council.

Also a petition from Spencer Taylor and 12 others asking for a grant of \$50 to repair south part of sideroad between lots 14 and 15 in 6th con, your committee ask that the matter be laid over until the next regular meeting of this council.

Your committee having received a request from the Freehold Loan Company asking for bonus on wire fence on sideroad between lots 10 and 12 on 5th con., beg to recommend that the condition of by-law in that matter be complied with.

Your committee having received a petition from Louis Gourlie and 14 others asking for a sum of money sufficient to repair sideroad between lots 24 and 25 in the 2nd con., ask that the matter be laid over until the next meeting in May.

Your committee have considered the application of Messrs. Fothergill and Fields, cutting roadway at Post Hill recommends that the chairman of this committee be and is hereby authorized to arrange this matter in the interests of the township.

On motion of Mr. Richards, report was adopted.

Mr. Underhill, seconded by Mr. Beare, moved that the reeve grant his order on the treasurer in favor of the parties recommended in the reports of the various standing committees as presented this day.

Mr. Beare, seconded by Mr. Richards, moved that the clerk be instructed to ask the several pathmasters to inform him as to the amount of grading required in their several divisions and to state when they could use the road machine to advantage.

Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Underhill, moves that the assessment roll for 1897 as presented by the assessor be received and accepted and that an order be drawn on the treasurer in favor of R. W. Mowbray for the sum of \$240 for his services as assessor for said year.

Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Richards, introduced and put through its various readings, a by-law to amend by-law No. 723, entitled "a by-law to appoint township officers for 1897," thus: As overseer of Div 18 the name of Geo. Richards instead of Wm. Hobbs; 31. Thos. Neal instead of Simon Irwin; 40. Robt. McBrady instead of John Percy; 31. Jos. Monkhouse instead of W. J. Monkhouse; 99. Geo. E. Richardson instead of E. E. Vanstone.

Mr. Richards, seconded by Mr. Beare, moved that we, the members of this

council, having been associated with the late Mr. James Hills and noticed his career as a member of this Board take pleasure in testifying to his ability as a public man, who in all his acts was a fearless and faithful representative of the people, and had been spared no doubt would have attained to the highest position in the gift of this township, and do hereby tender their heartfelt sympathy to Mrs. Hills and family in the sad bereavement by which they were deprived of a loving husband and a kind and indulgent father and this municipality of a faithful and true citizen and representative, and that a copy of this resolution be engrossed and forwarded to Mrs. Hills by the clerk.

Mr. Richards introduced and put through its various readings a by-law for the stopping up and sale of the original allowance for road between lots 2 and 3, in the 9th con of the township of Pickering.

Mr. Underhill, seconded by Mr. Barnes, moved that this council do now adjourn to meet again Tuesday, the 25th day of May at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., for the transaction of general business.
