A letter was read from the secretary of the Fire Underwriters' Association notifying the town that on account of its delinquency in complying with the demands of the association the fire insurance rate would be raised 15 per cent after June 1st. On motion the letter was laid on the table. 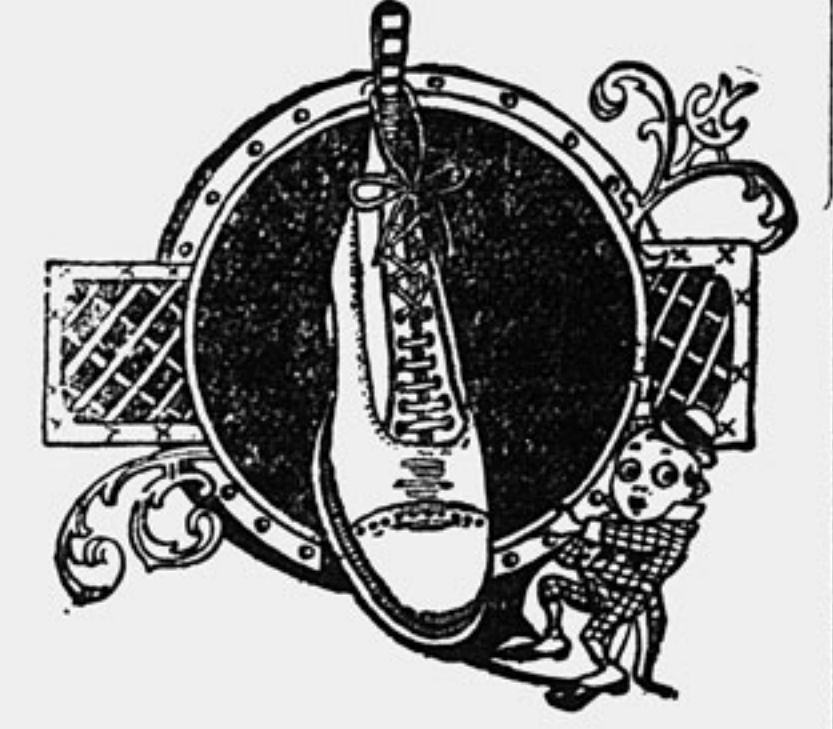
