Messrs. Jas Potter and Albert Tordiff have gone to England.

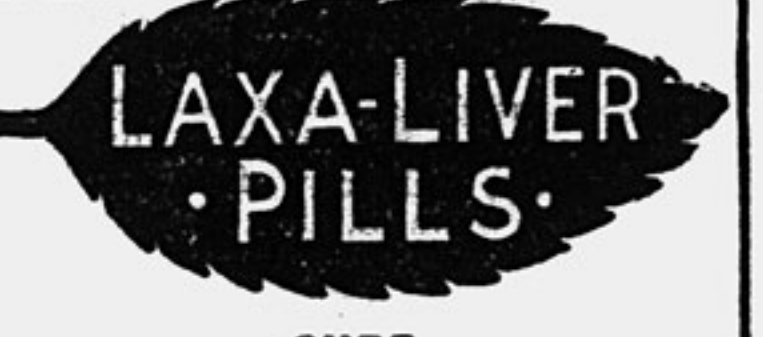
Special sacramental service in Methodist church next Sabbath evening.

### Oshawa Division Court.

A sitting of the division court was held in the town hall, here, on Tuesday last. His Honor Judge Dartnell, presiding. The business before the court was very light and quickly and easily disposed of. The following cases were heard:

Farewell vs. Fields.—This was a suit brought by Mr. A. R. Farewell, against Fred. Fields, East Whitby, for \$14.73, being a store account. Judgment for plaintiff, with costs. C. A. Jones for plaintiff.

Hugo vs. Fields.—This was a similar action to the above, in which Mr. Hugo, Columbus, claimed \$13.55—a store account—from Defendant Fields. Judgment for plaintiff, with costs. J. F. Grierson for plaintiff.

Elliott vs. Wilcox.—Judgment summons, in which D. Wilcox was ordered to pay Hy. Elliott, of Hampton, \$5 per month, by consent. J. F. Grierson for plaintiff.

Hinton vs. Graydon.—The parties to this suit live in Harmony, and the defendant, Mrs. Mary Graydon, is a mother-in-law of the plaintiff, Mr. Robt Hinton, who sues for \$100 for a board bill incurred by defendant, who also entered a counter claim for money and articles given plaintiff. The plaintiff claimed that defendant came to live with him in April 1894, and continued to reside there for some time. That he had only received a few small sums from her and that forty weeks board were still due. The defendant claimed that plaintiff requested her to live with his family, and no mention whatever was made of paying for her board. That she had done work for the family and had assigned to plaintiff her right in a supposed fortune of about \$15,000, in which she had a fourth interest, on the verbal understanding that if he received the fortune, he was to keep her during her lifetime. But it subsequently transpired that a nearer heir than Mrs Graydon was living and her claim was worthless. The judge looked upon the suit as a family quarrel and non-suited the plaintiff without costs, and allowing defendant to withdraw her counter claim. J. F. Grierson, for plaintiff; L. K. Murton for defendant.

King vs. O'Regan.—In this suit Jno O'Regan was subpoenaed to show cause why he had not complied with the order of the court, made last September, to pay Mr Wm King monthly installments in payment of a claim for rent, etc. The order was renewed, defendant to pay \$3.00 per month.
