The public will remember some weeks ago reading of a man called James Farewell being taken by guards to Kingston penitentiary and soon after the legs shackles were removed. It was on a G. T. R. train somewhere near Eglar, on while going at the rate of forty miles an hour and who made his escape. Several weeks ago he was again captured near Stratford and got away from three constables. Sunday night he stopped near Seagrave and hung about that section all day. Someone informed Mr. Arthur Miller that Farewell was at a neighbor's, he went to see him, and induced that genius to come with him, telling Farewell that a squad of police from Uxbridge was after him. He willingly went with Mr. Miller who took Farewell in the hotel and then into an upstairs room, and had it guarded well by a number of men and then telephoned for Chief Constable McKnight, who got the assistance of Mr. B. F. Crandell and they soon landed Farewell safely into the lockup for safekeeping. Constable McKnight kept guard over Farewell on Monday night. On Monday he seemed to be quite reconciled to his fate, but on Tuesday evening about seven o'clock while some citizens were passing the wall he heard the sound of crashing glass was heard and on looking a man was seen running from the building. It was soon seen that it was the prisoner Farewell, an alarm was at once given and in a few minutes' time about one hundred men were in pursuit of the prisoner. It looked at one time as if Farewell would elude the crowd but the white trousers that he wore gave him away and he was captured by the police near the residence of Mr. Miller, who was again placed on guard that night. Mr. Miller, of Seagrave, is deserving of credit for his ingenuity in inducing Farewell to go with him and in getting him placed in the hands of a legal constable. This man Farewell is one of the most cunning criminals that has been at large. He does not stop at anything when he sees the least chance of escaping and our town constables would do well to take a lesson from his experience of Tuesday evening and have the lockup made so secure that it would be impossible for such a genius to break out. Farewell said all he had to do was to kick off a few boards and it was easy work to get out. He said it was no trouble at all to get out of Port Perry lockup. The final chapter in this capture came to a close early on Wednesday morning. Deputy Sheriff Gundry, his brother, of Goddard, arrived in town at one o'clock in the morning with authority from the Crown Attorney of Huron county, backed by the Attorney General and took Farewell to Kingston penitentiary on the 7.40 a.m. train handcuffed and shackled and he will now serve his three years' sentence.
