



Ironing a Shirt.

The ironing board should be covered with several thicknesses of old blanket then with a white muslin cloth, all o which are stretched smoothly and tacked securely to the board. Two covers may be made like pillowslips. except that they are larger at one end than the other (as that is the shape of most of the isoning boards). A clean cover can be slipped on whenever the board is used. It should fit the board perfectly and be put on so the seams will be at; the edge of the board. A second board the size and shape of a shirt bosom and

covered like the first is also necessary. Begin by ironing the neckband; then fold the back and iron it, then the cuffs sleeves and front of the shirt. When ready to iron the bosom, slip the small board inside the shirt and press the bosom smoothly upon it. Wet a soft, white rag in hot water and rub the surface to remove any starch that may adhere to it. Iron until it is perfectly dry, pressing upon the front to give the desired polish. It is a very simple process when understood, and a little



Dr. Chase Cures Backets The Cow and Her Drink.

If a dairyman wants to treat himself to a genuine surprise, let him keep his herd of milk-giving cows in the stable, and give them water in such a way that the weight drank by each cow can be as certained, and be on hand so that each cow may have all she will desire, and when she wants it. We have been through a little experience of this kind and the quantity drunk by each cow was found out. It is an experiment one will not care to follow up more than a week before the faucet at the big tank will be turned and the cows allowed to drink out of the basins again, The trial was made with six cows, and it was found that the average quantity consumed daily varied with indivudial cows from 70 to 140 pounds. One cow drank this quentisy daily right along, and some the smaller quantity, with an average of 90 pounds daily

Another thing we found was that some of the cows would drink very often, i. e., their buckets would be frequently found empty, and others drank at longer intervals : and one cow wanted about all her 24 hours' supply at one time, and would only drink a little towards night. As these cows were being fed 50 pounds each of ensilage a day, it is seen at once that succulent food did not play any important part in the economy of drinking water. It was also found that the desire of a cow for water was about an hour after eating, but the evening thirst was never so great as in the morning.


