The north church was filled last Sunday to hear Mr Powers farewell sermon. He will be greatly missed.

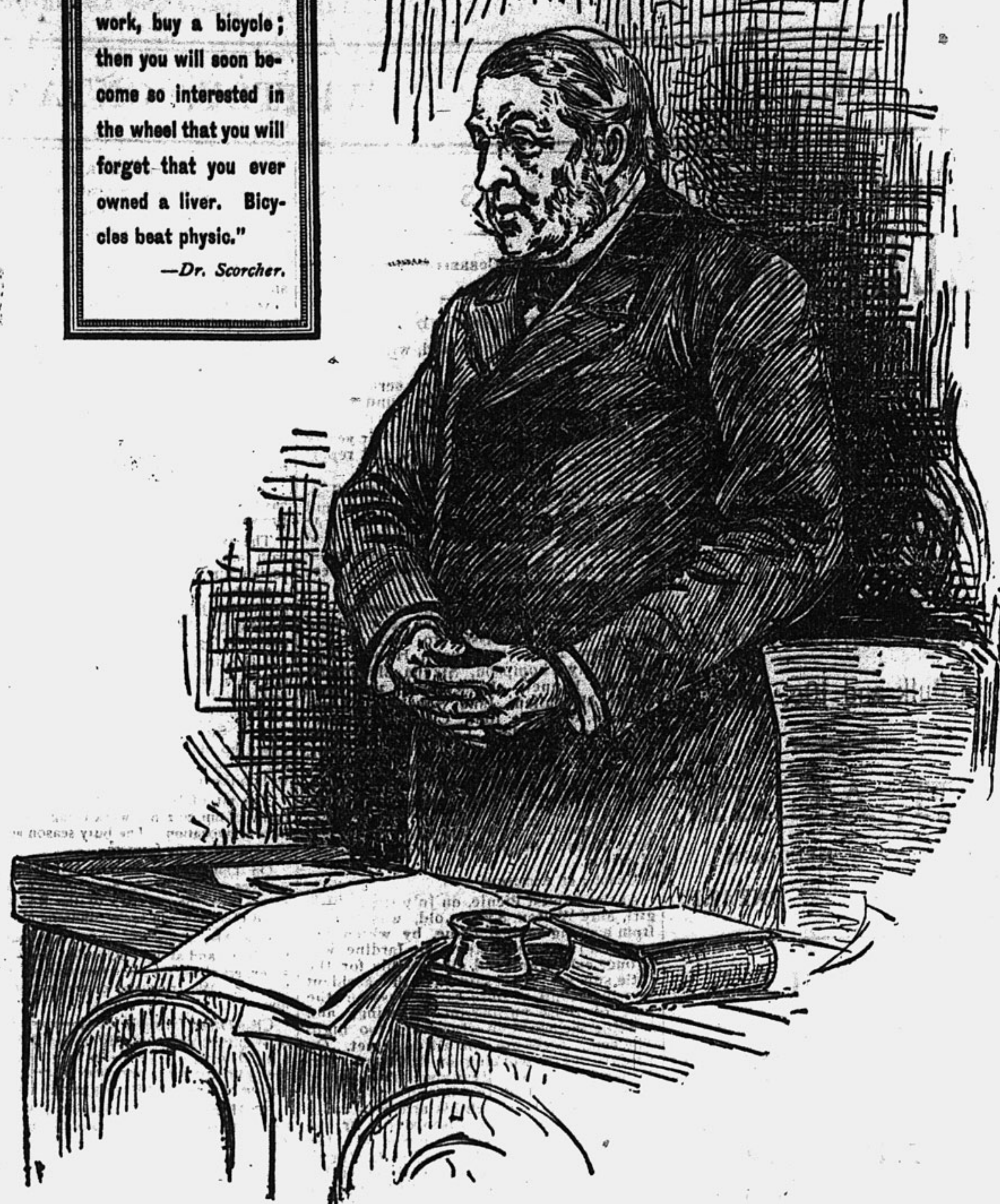
Mr George Umphrey and Miss J. E. Webster, of Odora, passed through on Sunday, taking children to Uxbridge to try the exams.

The Cow and Her Drink. If a dairyman wants to treat himself to a genuine surprise, let him keep his herd of milk-giving cows in the stable, and give them water in such a way that the weight drunk by each cow can be ascertained, and be on hand so that each cow may have all she will desire, and when she wants it.
