

Upon being interviewed the drinkers of the beverage denied this, but in the meantime a party was scraped up who volunteered to say that he had brought the beer there. number of times. Warning to Bicyclists. Those who ride bicycles should read our report of the town council proceedings on Monday pight. The members of council have heard many complaints, and feel that action will have to be taken it more commo sense is not used in riding wheels. For instance, last Saturday four or five girls of 12 or 14 galloped up and down the town ringing their bells and chasing people in all directions. These lasses will have to learn something or else the bicycle will be driver into a corner, for the town council now ha unlimited power. The fact that the council has issued a note of warning indicates that the fathers are inclined to be as lenient as sible, and to bear with the bicycle as long as is safe; but there is a limit to good wil and patience. We are in favor of the bicycle being used on the streets and walks both. The population of the town is small and scattered, and there are so many miles of idewalks that there is room for all. But it comes to a question of whether the wheel or the public shall leave the walks, we shall have to vote against the wheel. There is no reason why there should be any trouble, as there is room for all. No person needs to

step off the sidewalk to allow a wheel to pass. The council made a mistake in de-manding a bell, which startles one so that he or she cannot at once tell where it comfrom. The best way either in dark or day-light is to say when about fifteen yards be-hind: "Let me pass; please." The voice is a thing we are all familiar with, and does not startle a person. Without looking back the pedestrian may merely take the left side of the walk, and the bicycle will pass without danger on the right. Fast riding is a thing which cannot be allowed on any walk, and any rider who has no better sense than to scorch on a path or walk should be fined

We believe that ninetenths of the cyclists town exercise every courtesy towards the public; but there are a few children an brainless adults who have no need of a bicy-cle, but who will in the end cause sensible riders to be shorn of a valuable privilege.
