Detective Duncan, of Toronto, arrived in town last Saturday, on the 3.15 p.m. train, in search of a man named John Cashen, whom the provincial detectives have been looking for during the past 14 months. He found Constable Chas. Goodman and gave him a description of his man. Inside of an hour he was arrested and on his way to Toronto. The case is one that has been bothering the Toronto authorities for a long time, and the arrest is of importance. Most people will remember reading in the Toronto papers, in May last year, of a man being nearly kicked and beaten to death and then robbed there, in broad daylight, by a gang of young toughs. This John Cashen is the man. Directly after the above robbery Cashen left the city and his whereabouts was not known till Saturday. Three of the men who assaulted him were arrested and have been in jail ever since awaiting trial, and several detectives have since been searching for Cashen. During this time several letters were received in Toronto from England and one from Boston, purporting to be from Cashen and intended to mislead the detectives. Last week Detective Duncan learned that Cashen had relatives in Whitby and went there, and after making inquiries came to Oshawa. Cashen had been working at the Mallean Iron Works for about a week and it was there that Duncan arrested him. The detective waited in the office while Cashen was sent for, and when he found the detective waiting for him was completely overcome. There appears to have been a scheme between Cashen and the fellows who robbed him, through which he obtained a sum of money for slipping out. Cashen will appear at his assaillants' trial as a crown witness, and will also have to answer to the charge of felony afterwards. Detective Duncan was a happy man when he found that he had the right chap, as it is quite a victory for him.

Hall, are alike to be congratulated. Mr. Hall has been appointed to succeed the late James O'Dea as Landing-Water at this port. Mr. Hall, whose father was one of the pioneer manufacturers and contractors of Oshawa, has lived here all his life and is known to be possess of all the qualifications necessary to a full and proper discharge of the duties of the position which he has been called upon to fill.
