Short Notes.

Imperial Federation and Preferential Trade may never come to anything in any other way, but withal the boys have secured quite a few titles in advocating them.

"If slavery isn't wrong nothing is wrong," was the final argument of Abraham Lincoln before signing the emancipation proclamation. The argument has quite as much force when applied to a country which licenses liquor-selling.

Simcoe county is establishing a house of refuge on a basis that should solve the question everywhere. The trouble is usually to convince some of the northern municipalities that they cannot support their poor as well without a home of this sort. In Simcoe, each municipality is to pay in proportion to the use it makes of the house of refuge. The original cost is the only thing that will be levied upon all according to their assessments. After that the district which sends the poor people to be taken care of will have to pay ten times as much as the district which sends only one to be housed.

The Cobourg Sentinel-Star says the township of Darlington is trying to secede from the united counties of Northumberland and Durham, and wishes to cast its lot with Ontario county. The Sentinel-Star, however, very kindly warns Darlington that Ontario county has a floating debt in the banks of \$40,000 to \$50,000, its share of which Darlington would have to pay. Ontario has not a cent of floating debt in the banks, but a part of \$12,000 of a debenture debt, no part of which Darlington would have to pay if it joined this county. We are surprised at the Star making such a false statement of the matter. At the same time we might add that we do not see any advantage or disadvantage to be gained by Ontario county in admitting Darlington. That township may suit itself.

One half the United States people thought the election of McKinley would ensure the return of prosperity; the other half thought that it would bring good times to elect Bryan. It never occurred to either side that individual prosperity only follows in the individual effort. The idea that the policy of a government will make people rich is ridiculous. Yet there is awful kicking because McKinley has been president four months, and the dull times have not been abolished. The free-silverites with their unlimited lungs are raising a terrible howl, and even John W. Wainwright, the great republican, says McKinley has been tried and has failed. Even Wainwright does not appear to be willing to allow the McKinley party to pass laws establishing their tariff, before he weighs them in the balance and finds them wanting. This shows what folly is conceived with people's heads become filled with the idea that they must have a certain party in power in order to be sure of good crops, good prices, and good wages.

The Beaverton Express is a little cross-grained because the CHRONICLE two weeks condemned E-Reeve Treleven, of Beaverton, as the main agitator for the costly and utterly unused Torrens System of Land Transfer which has been set up in this county. We showed that Mr Treleven never let up on the idea, until finally the county council listened to his talk and ordered the system set up against the advice of its own committee. Mr Treleven's wall was that nearly half the land titles in Beaverton were bungled, and that they could not be quieted under the present system of deeds. The Torrens law certainly settles all disputes as to the title of any land so transcribed, but most of those suffering Beavertonites ever made any attempt to take advantage of its provisions. The introduction of the Torrens law in this county will cost about \$300, which is lost, and which will not be the end of the folly by a long way. These criticisms we still feel are perfectly just, but the Express charges us with sources, and asks what about the special grants made from time to time for the benefit of Whitty? This would probably furnish another subject for just criticism, only that no special grants were ever made for the benefit of the town of Whitty, nor were any ever asked for. We cannot find a cent that was ever received as a special grant to Whitty, not even in a remote way. The Express must have better information than is accessible to us, or else it is merely making a bluff assertion to turn aside the public mind from our proper condemnation of Mr Treleven's costly and unused scheme. When there is a big mistake made in public business we believe in having the blame laid on the right shoulders before the facts are forgotten. Our criticism of Mr Treleven was warranted, and every member of the county council for years back will testify to the position we take. Further, every member will agree with us that it is a pure myth, the story of the Express about special grants to the town of Whitty.
