Reach Council.

Met July 19. From Dr Archer, asking permission to erect a telephone line through a portion of Reach, beginning at the northern boundary of Port Perry and terminating at Epson or Uxbridge.

The assessor, Mr Stuart, submitted the awards made in equalizing the assessments of Union school sections with adjacent municipalities.—Union section No 17, Reach and Mariposa, on a basis of Reach 59 per cent, and Mariposa 41 per cent., to be in force for three years.

A deputation consisting of Messrs E J Wheeler and Thos Jeffrey waited on the council. Mr Wheeler was the principal spokesman, he said the object of their appearing was to make a proposition to the council regarding the graveling of the road opposite lot 17, con 5, about 80 rods.

The deputation then withdrew. On motion of Mr Stephens a grant of \$20 was made to be expended for graveling opposite lot 17, con 5, provided volunteer work to the extent of \$10 is done, and Messrs T Lamb and M Weir were appointed commissioners to expended said grant.

Mr Munro introduced the subject of their mission, he said about 80 rods of the road opposite lot 19, con 12, was in the trim to receive a coat of gravel and an expenditure of \$25 judiciously managed would accomplish the object the deputation had in view—the graveling of that portion of the road referred to and making a permanent job of it.

Mr Clemons said he acquiesced in the remarks made by Mr Munro and would further state that should the amount asked for be granted he would not be afraid to guarantee that no further aid would be required on that portion of the road for ten years; suitable ditching would be completed so as to carry off surplus water, and he was satisfied that the amount asked to be expended would be a judicious investment.
