#### Salt for the Cabbage Worm.

I am opposed to the use of Paris green  
in any form for cabbage worms, as it is  
dangerous. I have grown cabbage for

broth one-third with water. Dip a white  
broom into this mixture and shake it over  
the plants at any time when there is  
danger from the worms. The solution

ago.

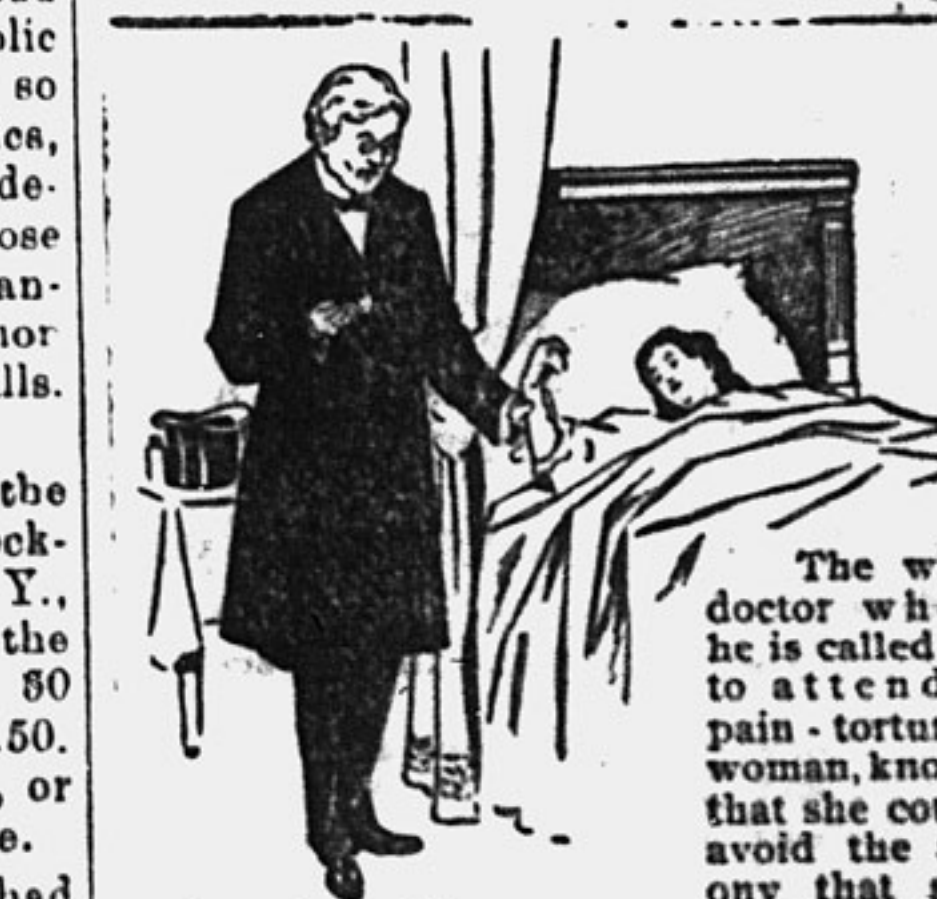
Mrs W E Vanstone has so far re-

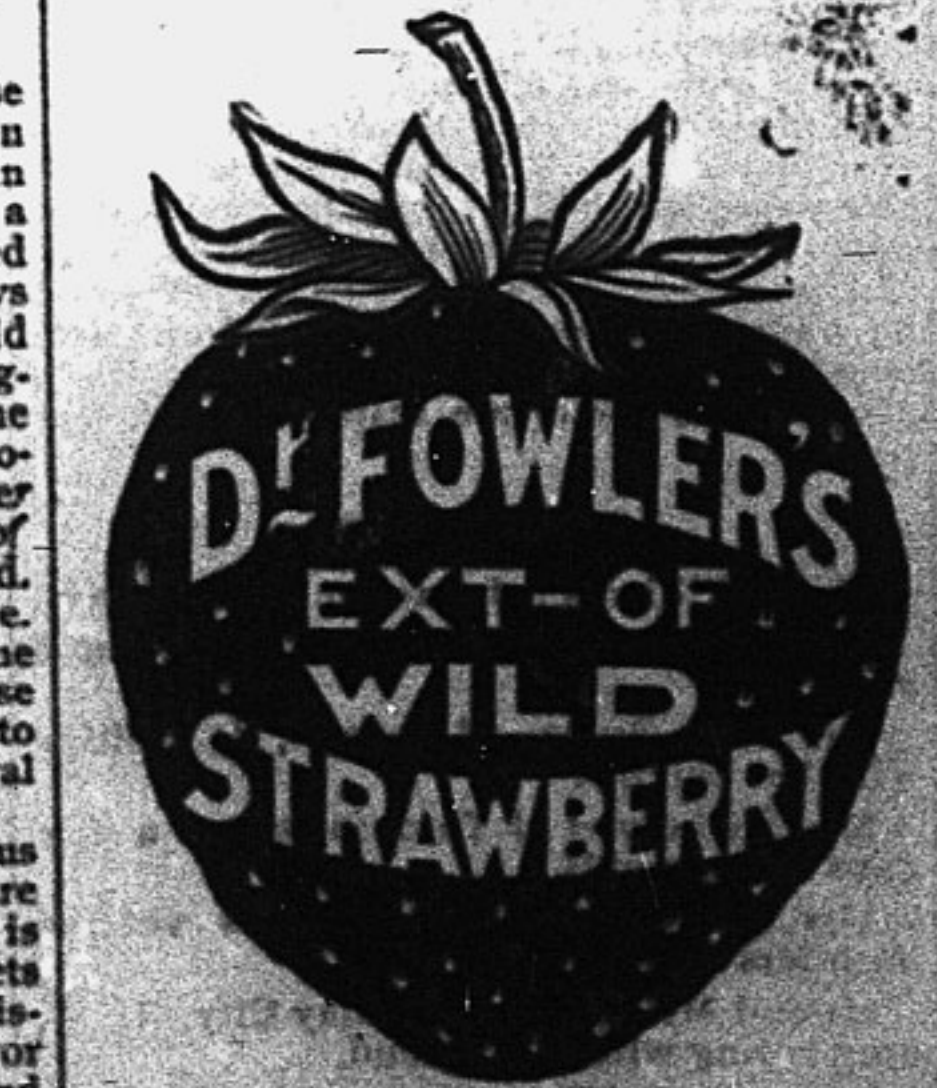
