A Double Drowning. A terribly sad drowning fatality occurred Friday night at Tooley's mill pond west of Courtice. Fred W. Morrow, aged 20, son of Mr. Robt. Morrow, and Norman E. Oke, youngest son of the late Richard Oke, were bathing when Oke attempted to swim across the pond. He was only learning and when over a very deep hole he was seen to sink. Young Morrow was sitting on a log watching him and seeing that he had sunk a second time swam out to his relief. Oke came to the surface again and seeing Morrow by the head they both sank together and were drowned. Two small boys seeing the accident, gave the alarm, but the pond had to be drained of water before the bodies were recovered. They were within a few feet of each other. It may be said truthfully that Morrow sacrificed his life in an endeavor to rescue his companion. As both boys were well and favorably known in the locality, there is great sadness in the hearts of all their acquaintances. Norman Oke's funeral took place Sunday morning from his home on the Oke homestead to Ebenezer, where Rev. Dr. Marvin preached a suitable discourse from the text "Prepare to meet thy God." The funeral was a very large one. Fred Morrow was buried at Union cemetery, Oshawa, Sunday afternoon, Rev. Dr. Marvin officiating. Both young men were members of St. Catherine's Division of the Sons of Temperance and the members turned out in regalia to their funerals in large numbers and conducted the ceremony of the Order at the graves.
