Mrs. Waram and her daughter, from Toronto, are visiting with Mrs. D. Campbell this week. Miss Underwood and Miss Holland, of Toronto, spent the holiday with Mr. Jno. Underwood. Principal Waugh has finished his duties as special examiner at the educational department, Toronto. Misses Nellie and Maggie Keane came from Toronto on Monday and spent the holiday with their parents. The Capitals of Ottawa and the Torontos played lacrosse at Roseville on Monday. B. meeting will be held in connection with the District Meeting, beginning at 2 p.m. Mr. Thos Rundle of Port Perry called on the CHRONICLE a few days ago. He was on his way home from a trip to North Dakota where his son is successfully conducting a large ranch. Mr. Rundle is much pleased with the Western States, and being a keen observer gives some very interesting accounts of the trip and the people of the far west. Roderick Dhu camp Sons of Scotland was organized years and years ago and an annual event of theirs ever since has been to gobble up the prizes offered, at the annual gathering, to the camp that is best dressed, best drilled, best in physique and best in all respects. On civic holiday they went to Oshawa where the annual games were held and were again victorious in carrying off the prize. When giving an account last week of the A.O.U.W. excursion to St Catharines we forgot to mention that the Whitby orchestra was on board under the leadership of Mr. Wm Carterley. Good music was furnished as long as it was possible to do so, the rolling and pitching of the boat making it impossible for the performers to play and keep their seats. It is one of the pleasures of an excursion to have music on board and the Whitby orchestra is always provided with good selections and are not afraid of tiring the passengers by playing too much. The tabernacle Sunday school and that of Metcalfe street, Oshawa, held a union excursion to Grimsby on Tuesday, and about 500 went along. The Metcalfe school had their boys brigade along, and this well disciplined squad of boys gave any amount of exhibition manoeuvres under command of Capt W E Dyer. Grimsby park is about 100 acres in extent, is well kept, and furnished with shade for tens of thousands. It is intended some years ago to make it a Canadian Chataqua, where a lecture course could be indulged in whilst summering, but the scheme is not succeeding very well. The children had a big day of it both on the boat and at the park. There was no sea sickness on board, and everything went off well. Some people are always complaining about boys bathing in their naked skins at the bay. This to our mind is about as rank a piece of prudery as people could be guilty of. There is not a young man or boy in town who would seek to offend against decency, and there is plenty of room for all. We doubt very much if there is anybody in town who would go blind if a boy were discovered minus his apparel, and if there be any such sensitive people they had better keep away from the lake. There are hundreds of boys who cannot afford to buy bathing displays, and these have as much right to bathe as anybody. For the sake of decency these people, the less frequently they see, the better for them. They are asked to bathe in very much like the howl about the bicycle-it comes from a few cranks. Bathing does a world of good in many ways, and those who would die if they saw a nude boy had better take their exercise on land. The Homeletic Review. The HOMILETIC REVIEW for August certainly does not fall far behind the previous numbers in the richness of the material offered for aiding the preacher in preparation for his pulpit work. The opening article of the Review is entitled, "The Characteristic of the Preacher," by D. D. L. D., of Louisville Theological Seminary, grapples with that tough problem, "How the Non-Churchgoing Masses are to be Reached in Order to bring them the Gospel." This is quite distinct from the subject the Professor so practically and concretely sometimes since named, "The Kind of Preaching Needed Among the Unevangelized People of Our Country." It takes up the prior problem, "How to get the people where the preacher is," so that he may preach to them at all. This is a question that concerns a very large and increasing proportion of the people of this country. Mr. W. S. Lilly, one of the ablest writers in Great Britain on literature and ethics, furnishes a paper on "The Pulpit and Liberty," which will be found a valuable statement of the nature of real liberty and the relation of the pulpit to it. In discussing "The Personal Factor in Preaching," Dr. J. Spencer Kennard has so forth the personal elements that have so largely to do with power in preaching. Dr. Dewart of Toronto, exhibits with great clearness and force "The Characteristics and the Collapse of the 'Tabernacle' School of Criticism," "Archdeacon Sinclair's Lectures," "The Present Condition of the Church Worship of England," and Professor McCurdy of Toronto discusses "The Creation-Story—Its Origin." The other portions of the Review are full of helpful material from the editors and from such leading thinkers and writers as Dr. T. D. Den Blake, James M. Lindsay, Arthur T. Benson, Louis Albert Banks, C. B. Halbert, D. S. Gregory, Wayland Hoyt, J. H. W. Stockenborg, and many others. It is up-to-date in topics, interesting the preacher along all lines. Inspector McBrien passed through town on Monday morning en route to Atlantic City, N. J. Misses Ethel Robinson and Lillie Leslie, of Toronto, were with Miss B Campbell on civic holiday. Mrs M Michael, New York, and Mrs Clason, Toronto, are visiting their sister, Mrs J D Howden. Mr Fred J Gibson and Miss Gibson, New York, the former a famous advertising expert, spent a day here last week. Mr Wm Smith, for 20 years foreman in King Bros tannery, has accepted a position in Messrs Bickell & Wickett's, Toronto. Miss Henderson, Miss Aggie Dow and Miss Bertha Tamblin joined Mr A G Henderson and party at Pine Point on Monday. The Grand Trunk railway authorities have decided upon a new regulation uniform for the passenger train crews. The brass buttons will be done away with, being substituted by white metal. On each lapel of the collar will be the name of the road. Each man will be expected to wear a stand-up collar and white shirt, with a neat tie. The Grand Trunk people are always up to date, but we don't think this new regulation will be very applicable to the engineers and firemen. Educational. August 16th, rural schools re-open. August 17th, normal schools open. August 23rd applications for admission to County Model school will be done away with. Later than this day, September 1st—High and public schools in towns and incorporated villages re-open. September 2nd—County model school opens. Smallpox Scare. Toronto had a smallpox scare on Sunday last. The authorities at Belleville had telegraphed to Toronto Saturday night that a smallpox suspect had boarded the Richlieu steamer, Passport, at Belleville. Dr Sheard, medical health officer of Toronto at once chartered a tug to meet the Passport and he and his assistants went aboard the vessel, which was anchored at the wharf on Sunday morning. The man whose name is Whitney, was found to be spotted with pox and burning with fever, and was sent to the isolated hospital up the Don river. The Passport was anchored in the bay to be disinfected, and the passengers will be quarantined under close guard in tents on Toronto island for two weeks. They are mostly Americans, and all foreigners. Early in the Business. Michael Fallen, aged about 10 years, has been flush of money around town for some time past. At a meeting of the board celebrating the Queens Jubilee.
