ORILLIA

Mr McCormick's Idea. Geo McCormick, M.P., views the outlook for the lumber industry during the coming winter in anything but a favorable light.

While he is heartily in favor of an export duty being imposed by the Canadian Government on sawlogs and pulp wood, Mr McCormick is of opinion that the Government should not bring the act into force for a year hence, for the reason that there are thousands of settlers in the Georgian Bay lumber district that have no other means of earning a livelihood during the coming winter except by lumbering.

If the imposition of the export duty is delayed, Mr McCormick is of opinion that the American owning limits—and they are in the majority—will at once put in the usual number of camps, and thus keep the settlers employed, while in a year hence they would be prepared for a dull season, provided the Government announced such a course as suggested.

Mr McCormick further said that the recent heavy shipments of lumber from Canada have filled the American lumber yards, and the dealers there can get along without cutting any timber this winter, but that if the Americans knew that the export duty would take effect a year from now they would take out a large number of logs and float them to the other side before the act would come into force.

By the close of the season, provided the Government announced such a course as suggested, Mr McCormick further said that the recent heavy shipments of lumber from Canada have filled the American lumber yards, and the dealers there can get along without cutting any timber this winter, but that if the Americans knew that the export duty would take effect a year from now they would take out a large number of logs and float them to the other side before the act would come into force.
