

Pickering Council. Met Monday last. Several letters were read and some parties were heard on matters of no great interest.

A bylaw was passed to divide the township into school sections, the object being to correct errors in former bylaws.

ASKING ANOTHER VOTE.

Mr W Finlayson, representing Messrs Duvernay & Jones, barristers, Toronto, presented a petition from 542 ratepayers of the township in favor of taking another vote on local option. He claimed that the council can be forced by law to take a vote at once, and urged that this be done in order that those seeking licenses may commence selling liquor as soon as possible.

Reeve Mowbray said that no vote would be taken until the new lists were finished, but as to whether one would be allowed then the council would presently decide.

The following is the petition:

To the Municipal Council of the Township of Pickering:—

The Petition of the undersigned ratepayers and electors of the Township of Pickering in the County of Ontario:

SHETHWAS AS FOLLOWS:

1. Your petitioners are desirous of the repeal of by-law number 668 of the said township, being a by-law to prohibit the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in the said Township of Pickering.

2. That the said by-law has been ineffective, and has caused a considerable loss of business in the said township.

3. That the said by-law has been the cause of much litigation, and involved the township in very heavy expenditures in connection therewith.

4. That the said by-law causes an annual loss of revenue of about \$600 to the said township, besides the expense of enforcing the said by-law.

5. That a by-law to repeal said by-law No 668 was submitted to the electors of the said township on the 5th day of January 1897, but the voting thereon was attended with such gross irregularities and improper reception of votes that it is impossible to ascertain whether the majority was for or against said by-law, as appears by the report of His Honour Judge Dartnell dated the 8th day of June 1897.

6. That the said voting has been declared invalid and void, as appears by the said report.

7. That application has been made to your council for submitting again the said by-law for a vote thereon, and that upon such application your council required that a petition should be presented for such purpose, and this petition is presented without prejudice to the right of your petitioners or any of them to take proceedings to enforce the submission of a by-law to repeal by-law No 668 in pursuance of the provisions of The Liquor License Act and the said Report of His Honour Judge Dartnell.

Your petitioners therefore pray: That a by-law may be at once submitted to the electors of the said township to repeal said by-law No. 668.

Mr Finlayson threatened the council with a mandamus compelling them to take a vote, and spent an hour or two persistently urging and insisting. Finally a motion was passed to have another vote before the end of the year, but not until the new voters lists are completed.

A contemporary does not like hog wallows. We do. A hog was never injured by a good wallow.


The merciful man will have shade for his stock. So will the man who works for the greatest profit.

Reach Township Council.

All the members were present at the regular meeting of this council on Monday. Reeve Real in the chair.

The following communications were read:

From the Bureau of Industries, asking the Clerk for the names of all the pathmasters in the township. Clerk wrote.

From Col N F Paterson, Uxbridge, asking grant for the 34th Battalion. No action taken.

Mr Camplin introduced and carried through a by-law No 1008 to borrow money by striking out the figures \$4000 and inserting in lieu thereof the figures \$5000.

Mr Lambe introduced a by-law to appoint a collector of taxes for 1897. The by-law was read a first time and the council went into committee of the whole thereon. On motion of Mr Real the committee arose, reported progress and asked leave to sit again.

Mr Stephen said there was a bridge near Chalk Lake which was in a dangerous condition and suggested that a committee be appointed to consider and look after the repairing of it. The council thought Mr Stephen quite capable of looking after it, so he was instructed to have the bridge repaired.

By-laws were introduced and passed to raise by assessment the following sums:—County purposes, \$2661.00; Township, \$1536.08; Poor fund, \$898.61; Educational purposes, \$2677.50; General purposes, \$2595.98.

As S S Nos. 10 and 15 did not communicate with the clerk the amounts their respective sections wanted were unable to give the correct figures.

The total amount requires the following rate per hundred dollars assessed:—County 13 1/4c, township 13c, poor 4 1/4c, educational 13 1/4c, general purposes 13c.

Treatment of Hives.

AN ANNOYING AILMENT WHICH AFFLICTS CHILDREN IN SUMMER.

About this time of year children are apt to be more or less troubled with hives. Usually they are not a menace to life, but they are a great discomfort to the child and its mother. All are familiar with this condition, so it need not be described at length. They suddenly flash out on a seemingly healthy skin and as suddenly disappear. They are at first a pinkish red color, soon changing to a deep red. It rubbed they become surrounded by a whitish ring which has given to them the appropriate name, "wheels." They are intensely itchy and almost drive a child frantic. The most urgent indication is to ally the irritation this may be done with varying degrees of success with various applications. A favorite remedy is a saturated solution of bicarbonate of soda—ordinary baking soda. Possibly a better remedy is pulverized boric acid dissolved in glycerine or comoline and lightly rubbed over the surface. A remedy I have used with satisfaction, though it has a very disagreeable odor, in a solution of Carbolic acid, a teaspoonful to a pint of water, the mixture to be shaken for 15 minutes to get the acid thoroughly broken up. A good authority gives these directions for the relief of this affliction: Wash the child with soda water, then dip the finger or rubber oil and bathe each individual hive, rubbing the oil well into the skin.

The cause of hives is generally found in the digestive tract, so the diet and the bowels should be carefully looked to. One of the saline purgatives should be given to carry off any undigested material that may be present, then all rich and heating foods should be withheld. The child should be kept as still as possible to avoid overheating the blood.
