Whitby Tp Council

Met Monday Sept 6. A number of accounts were presented and submitted to council. Communication from city clerk of Toronto asking to appoint delegate to tax exemption convention to be held in Toronto. No action was taken.

From Austin Road Machine Co re machinery for work on roads. A bylaw was introduced and passed authorizing the levy and collection of \$107.14 for county purposes, and \$383.92 for road debenture purposes, also for \$445.84 for school purposes and \$208.06 for township purposes.

The estimated expenditure for the year is: Roads and bridges, \$1400; indigents, \$350; salaries and board of health, \$850; sheep killed \$100; printing \$50; election expenses \$50; misc, \$150.

The rate for 1897 being 1.610 mills on the dollar or 1.10 less than last year. A petition was presented from residents of Brooklin asking to be set apart from the township for the purpose of procuring street lamps and maintaining same. The council postponed action on petition until Saturday next at 5 p.m., generally intimating that if the people of the village wished for same they should pay for same their request would be granted. Some of the council, however, expressing the opinion that coal oil lamps as proposed would not in the end be found satisfactory. The opinion prevails to some extent, that a very few of said lamps might be purchased as an experiment by the township before setting apart the village for said purpose, and if found satisfactory then to set apart for further providing and maintaining. The matter is expected to receive the consideration of council on Saturday next. Mr R A Carpenter and A Jeffrey were each paid 1/2 value of the above property. Several accounts, principally for road jobs, amounting to \$184, were ordered to be paid. Council adjourned until Saturday 11th inst. at 5 o'clock p.m.

Met Monday Sept 6. Communications were read from M J Butler, C.E, requesting to meet the council at some later date than agreed upon; from Jas Gallagher re weeds on lot in Cedar Dale. The sum of \$24 was granted Thos Slep, being refund of statute labor. The clerk was instructed to write Mr Kenny requesting him to remove the weeds and thistles from his lot at Cedar Dale. A rate of 2.610 mills was struck for township, educational and poor fund. Roads and bridges—Thomas Campbell \$26.68, James McWatters \$1.50, Joseph Pierson \$25.20, James Stocks Jr, \$13.75, Sylvanus Trevall \$25.50. A Farewell \$11.20. Thos Couric \$9.92, Thos Campbell \$14. Joseph Hubbard relief Thos Ross \$1, John Ross, \$4.15, Fred Glover \$1, James Stocks Jr, \$13.21. G H Grierson \$6.65. A Farewell \$5.50. Fred Lee Coets, Judge Dartnell revising assessment roll, \$5; Rowell & Hutchinson, \$12. Council adjourned to meet the first Monday in October. Wm Pirves, Clerk.
