Dairy and Creamery.

We exported to Europe last year 21,938,000 pounds of butter.

This is the best season for dairymen to buy milk feed to last them all year. The mills are crammed with wheat and grain and the mill men want to sell the cow feed to get it out of the way. Consume quickly they will let it go cheap. Muster your ready cash and take it to the mill, and you will get a bargain in feed.

As a rule it is certainly not well for cows to remain in milk all the time. What is gained in one way is lost in another, and the constantly milked cows yield will not be so great after calving as that of the one which ran dry a month.

In very fine butter there is 80 per cent of pure butter fat. The other 20 per cent is made up of various other solids and salt and water.

Canadian butter rates higher commercially in Europe than ours. The reason is the Canadians have studied, carefully the tastes of the European market and suited their butter to it whilst we have not.

In summer, where one has worked up the right kind of market, there is considerably more profit in selling cream than butter.
