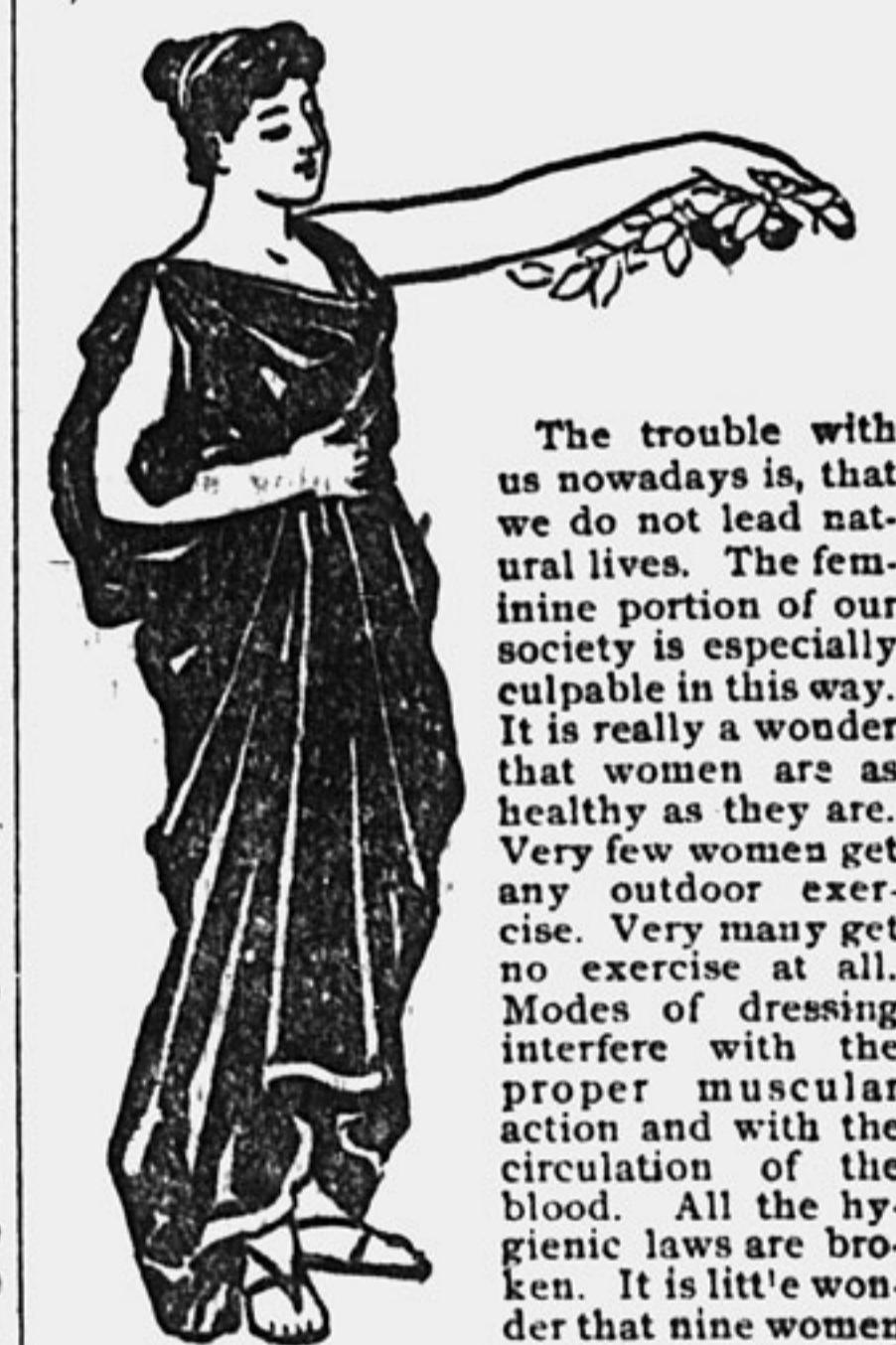
Mr Foster returned on Thursday from Claremont where he has been visiting for a few days.

UKERIDGE

In and about Lindsay a crusade has been commenced against the practice of town merchants erecting large sign boards on the public highway to advertise their wares and at the same time scare every horse that comes along. There are a few sign boards on some of the roads leading into Uxbridge which do not add materially to the equanimity of either horse or driver.

The Voters list for the township of Uxbridge was revised by Judge Dartnell last Wednesday, when over 200 appeals were taken up. 117 appeals were entered by the Conservatives and 80 by the Reformers, all being disposed of except 82 of the former and 17 of the latter which will be taken up at the adjourned sittings to be held on 24th inst. Out of their 87 appeals the Reformers were successful so far with 45 names, 19 dismissed, 5 nominal changes and 17 names adjourned. The Conservatives out of their 117 appeals were successful with 59 appeals, 8 dismissed, a few changes and 88 names adjourned. Thus Conservatives have made a gain of 15 appeals so far and are sure to increase their gains when the court resumes, to between 80 and 40. T W Chaplin, M.P.P., looked after the interests of the Reformers, and Col. Patterson, Q.C., and S. S. Sharpe, who spent much time in preparing the appeals looked after the interests of the Conservatives.—Times.
