ORILLIA

Must take out licenses. John Regan, who will issue hunters licenses in this town for the coming season, wrote the department enquiring if it was the intention of the Government to permit settlers in North Orillia, Matchedash, Medonte, Bams, and Mara to shoot deer without taking a license. The reply received from Chief Warden Timbley was that in the township named there would be no exemptions, but that it was possible, "that in a number of the Northern townships the settlers may be exempt from taking out deer licenses." Mr Regan scarcely expected any other reply to his enquiry, but there were so many people asking for information on the subject that he thought it better to get a positive statement from the department. Applications for licenses should be in early. Last year the parties who put off until the last moment came nearly not getting any, the demand being greater than the supply.—Times.

Planer took two fingers. While operating a buzz planing machine in the J R Eaton planing mill on Thursday afternoon last, Myron Froats, of Elgin street, got his right hand caught in the knives, which cut off the index and second fingers. Mr Froats will nurse his injuries for a month or more.

The county grant not paid yet. At the last regular meeting of the High School board, the treasurer reported that the supplementary grant claimed from the county and presumably passed early in the year had not been paid. The county treasurer was communicated with and asked to explain. His reply by letter was that the payment had not been authorized by the special committee to which it and similar claims from other High schools and Collegiate Institutes had been referred. The amount of claim is \$290.94. The secretary was instructed to ask Mr Jupp to enquire into the matter. It was moved by Messrs Doolittle and Slaven, and resolved, "That the mover and seconder of this motion, with the secretary, be a special committee duly authorized hereby, to correspond by means of a circular with the different High School boards in Ontario, with the object of devising some common method of petitioning the Ontario Parliament to amend section 81, sub section 7, of the High School Act of 1890, so as to make it compulsory on the county councils to pay for the maintenance of pupils from their respective counties attending High Schools in other counties than those in which such pupils reside."—News Letter.
