Archbishop Cleary Again.

(From the Toronto World, Oct. 25th.) Archbishop Cleary created a sensation at Kingston on Sunday by his promulgation of the mandate read from the pulpit of St Marys Cathedral, in which he says : "We hereby declare, with all the author-

ity of the church vested in us us Archbishop of Kingston and your chief pastor, that any Catholic in our metropolitan city or diocese who shall hereafter presume to enter any non-Catholic edifice to assist at what is termed "a marriage ceremony" or "service for the dead," even though he should not take any active part in the performance, renders himself guilty of mortal ain by dishonoring the religion of his baptism and defying the laws of the holy church and giving public scandal before society; and we furthermore reserve to ourselves alone the power to absolve from this heinous sin."

The occasion for this mandate was that at a recent marriage in a congregational church, "a marriage ceremony, which was a mere secular contract, not a whit more sacred than any two heathens," Catholics were present as witnesses; and, what is ity of the church vested in us as Archbishop

Their conduct he termed "an insult to the holy faith they profess," His Grace also reprimanded those Catholics who attended a service for the dead in a non-Catholic church, in view of fact that the performance is known and proclaimed by its participants as of no service to the dead. It was because of the luke-warmness of Catholics in regard to these things that the mandate was promulgated.
