When rescued they were on the point of giving up. The younger of the two is said to have been the pickiest and encouraged his brother to hang on by saying several times, as cheerfully as the dismal circumstances permitted, "I think I see a boat coming now."—Orillia News Letter.

They Like the West.

Mr Wm H Webster and son Albert returned on Friday last from Carman Man, and since then have been kept busy answering the enquiries of their many friends regarding the country. Mr Webster went west in the spring and purchased two adjoining quarter sections, or 820 acres, situated about 56 miles from Winnipeg. One of the farms, having 102 acres under crop, a small house and out-buildings, was secured at a bargain from the owner, who also sold his live stock and implements, and in the course of a week after his arrival Mr Webster was as comfortably fixed as he could possibly desire. In August he wrote for his son Albert, who left on the G. T. R. harvest excursion of Aug 18th. The 102 acre under crop yielded over 2,200 bushels of No 1 hard wheat, nearly all of it being sold at 86c. Albert states that the men who flocked in from all parts of the province obtained ready employment at \$30 to \$35 per month, and many have decided to return in the spring and take up land.

Shot a Lynx.

Boboageon Independent: The lynx or what is commonly called the wild cat, is very rarely met with in this district, but on Friday last Master Harry Reid distinguished himself as a hunter by bringing in a specimen of the critter. He was down by Nogeys Creek bridge looking for partridge when he spied four or five some things prowling around. He was not quite sure what they were, but as he had never seen anything of the kind in a domesticated state, he made up his mind to have a blaze at them anyway. The shot rang from Harry had was not an up-to-date arm, but it was considered good enough for partridge. It opens at the butt much like a bank safe, and when you know the trick of closing her down, there's a chance of the charge coming out the right end. With five wild cats around him, Harry picked out the nearest, took steady aim and let her go. She went, and so did the cats—four of them to the swamp as quick as they could go, and one much quicker to the happy hunting grounds. Harry then tucked the animal under his arm and made for home. The Canada lynx is described as being grey in color with dark markings, both tailed, large velvety paw, average height 2 ft., length 3 ft. 4 in., and weight 25 lbs. The lynx breeds once a year, in May or June, and has two or three at a time. Harry was under the average and plainly demonstrates the scarcity of partridge.—Post.

**White-wash for the Poultry House.**

An exchange gives an excellent recipe for whitewash that will not rub off or blister:—

"Slake half a bushel of quicklime with boiling water, keeping it covered during the process. Strain it and add a peck of salt, dissolved in warm water; three pounds of ground rice, put into boiling water and boiled to a thin paste; half a pound of powdered whiting and a pound of clean glue, dissolved in warm water; mix these well together and let the mixture stand for several days. Keep the wash thus prepared in a bottle or portable furnace, and put it on as hot as possible. For poultry houses a little carbolic may be added to advantage."

**To Render Iron Waterproof.**

Countless attempts have been made to deal with the rust problem in iron structures. A new process has been suggested which consists in treating the iron with a solution of ferrocyanide. This forms a coating of cyanide of iron that is stated to be uniform and impermeable to such a nature as to effectively prevent the iron so covered. The solution is mixed with a fatted varnish to which has been added a little turpentine or benzol, so as to cause a very homogeneous emulsion which can be applied without difficulty. The evaporation of the alcohol leaves the fatted varnish, which forms a coat and protects the cyanide of iron which is deposited upon the metal. The iron requires no preparation for the treatment beyond removing any rust that may already have been formed, and which may be too thick to admit of the action of the ferrocyanide.
