The circular calls attention to the fact that by a recent provision of the law in Quebec, when garnisheo proceedings are instituted against an employe of the company, the latter is con pelled to go through certain form the suffered intense pain. It is made to be cut off, but under the ownful additional expense, trouble and overcome, and Mr Sutilife is Jeeling in better stall so much additional expense, trouble and risk of loss upon the company that in future
