The above council met pursuant to adjournment on Monday Nov 8th, at the Township hall, Brockham. All members present excepting First Deputy Richards, Reeve Mowbray in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

R. Deverell was heard asking for culvert on 2nd con, opp lot 18.

Geo Cowan, jr was heard re Deckers hill and bridge to the south of it.

A number of accounts were read and referred to the various standing committees.

J. H. Connor and D. O'Neil were heard re ditches and culverts on Brook road, 3rd con.

Jas McCrae presented a petition of Noah Burkholder and 11 others asking for grant to gravel 3rd con road, opp lot 35.

Mr Barnes, as chairman of contingent committee secured the passage for the following accounts: Municipal World Co., St. Thomas, supplies and blank forms on local option, \$122. James Hubbard on account, \$9. W J Clark, advt. local option, by law, 4 weeks 116, 50 copies of instructions to D.B.O., and advt re appointing scrutineers and ballots, \$29.02; R. B. Mowbray, reeve, two trips to Toronto interviewing Provincial Cabinet and York County Council re Rooge bridge and roadway, and telegraphing, \$10.50; Thos Beare, trip to Toronto on same mission, \$5; D R Beaton, clerk, trip to Toronto, \$5.

Mr Beare, as chairman of the indigent committee secured the passage of the following accounts: J O Hutchinson M.D., attendance and medicine re Miss Gray in Oct, 1st to Oct. 22nd, 15 visits, \$10; W. W. Wison, jr., for aid and attendance re Miss Gray during illness, 4 weeks at \$3 per week, \$12.00.

Your committee recommends that the chairman wait on Markham village council at the next meeting and put in claim for amount of above accounts, Miss Gray having been a resident of said corporation at the time of commencement of late illness.

Snow Blindness.

The Fearful Suffering It Entails Sometimes Leads to Madness.

"It is absolutely necessary to protect the eyes in some way. I wore a black slouch that pulled down over them. In addition we lashed goggles manufactured by the Indians, which fulfill the purpose for which they are intended. These are made of bits of wood, oval shaped, like the glasses of spectacles. They have small slits in them, so that one can see, but the eye is shaded and not affected."

Wintering Cabbages.

If you wish to use the cabbages regularly in small quantities, the most convenient place to keep them is in a cool dry cellar. But do not put them in a cellar used for milk and butter. What you intend to use in late winter and early spring can be buried. Pull them only when dry, wrap the outer leaves closely around each head, stand them, roots up, on the surface of dry ground in single or double rows and cover with a ridge of earth.

For keeping a few dozen heads of cabbage for use during the winter barrels may be filled with trimmed heads, placed lengthwise in a shallow trench and covered with a layer of dry leaves, chaff or straw and a top covering of six or eight inches of earth. Pull and store only when the cabbages are dry.

Quince Cakes.

From a German school of cookery comes a recipe for "quitten quod," or quince cakes, which sounds very tempting to a lover of this golden lined fruit of autumn. Boil the quinces whole, without peeling them, till quite soft; then peel and core them. Work the pulp through a coarse sieve. Allow a pound of sugar to a pound of fruit. Moisten the sugar with a little water and boil it until beads form: then put in the fruit and boil this, with constant stirring, to a stiff, smooth jam. Make little trays of white paper, fill them half an inch thick with the fruit and put them to dry in a cool oven or spread the mass out thin on plates and when somewhat dried set them to get cold. Cut the fruit into any small shapes. Those dried on paper are removed by dipping the paper into cold water.
