Handing the desperado some twelve dollars she fled down stairs, and securing a tin box in which was \$1000, escaped to the nearest neighbors. The robber ran sacked the house, and in the meantime Mr Bowman, who is somewhat crippled left the house and went into the garden. On leaving the house the burglar noticed Mr Bowman and assisted him up the steps and handing him some matches told him that he had better go back to bed. Mrs Bowman claimed to have recognized the bold intruder and had a warrant issued for the arrest of Harry Jones, who has always lived in Bowmanville and who is a well known citizen. He was charged in the county judges criminal court of burglarizing the premises of Mr and Mrs Bowman. At the trial they failed to identify the prisoner, and as he was prepared to prove an alibi, the case was dismissed. The sequel to the trial now appears in the shape of a high court writ for \$5000 damages for malicious prosecution and slander brought by Jones against Bowman and his wife. The Bowmans are very close living, but wealthy people. It is said that Bowman is one of the richest men in this district. It is reported that some time ago he sold a lot of bank stock in Toronto and returned with a check for \$50,000 which no bank here was able to cash.

MANILLA

Case of false pretenses laid by Dr J J Hunter against Albert Allan was disposed of on Monday last by W. B. Sanborn, Esq., who committed Allan to stand his trial at the Toronto Sessions.

ORILLIA

To Restrict Borrowing.
A Lindsay deputation waited upon the Attorney-General at Toronto on Friday asking that amendment be passed to the Municipal Councils from borrowing money for current expenditure until the same levied therefor shall be collected. Consideration was promised.

The fine was heavy.
Lucy Cooley of the British Arms hotel, Coldwater, was charged by Inspector McKay on Monday before Messrs Lovering and Brown, JPs, with a third infraction of the License Act. Jas Halverson, of Toronto counsel for the Hotelkeepers Protective Association, appeared for the defendant, who agreed to plead guilty if the terms of the charge were modified to make the offence a second instead of a third. The prosecution acquiesced and the magistrate imposed a fine of \$60 and costs.

A street car bus.
Mr F J Daly, of the Daly House, has placed an order for a handsome and commodious street car bus, which will run in connection with his popular hostelry. The vehicle will be unlike others now in use in Orillia. It will accommodate 28 passengers, is more than double the capacity of the old bus. This new street conveyance is described in being closer in appearance to a street car than any other, also, having the coach body of a street car and being low set. It is expected to arrive in a couple of weeks. In the meantime an old bus from the Benson house, Lindsay, is supplying the Daly House service and from trains.

Get there as last.
Mr Lewis Harris enjoys the distinction of being the first Canadian to receive from the Toronto University the degree of Doctor of music. It was in Orillia, however, that Mr Harris got his rudimentary musical education. His father was Rev H Harris, the first minister in charge of the old Primitive Methodist church, now Mitchells music hall. It is said that the younger Harris was incorrigible and that his father was, on different occasions, compelled to lock his son in the room with the piano to make certain that his practice would not be neglected.—News Letter.

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
