

Three Employees Complete 25 Years With Goodyear Here

Three employees of the local Goodyear plant, Ed Rundle, Ted Clarke, and Jim Martin were honoured recently on their completion of 25 years with the company.

Charles Catran, the manager, presented each with a diamond studded 25-Year Service Pin and a \$100 cheque from the company.

Mr. Rundle attended Public and High School in Bowmanville, and was a leading Junior and Intermediate hockey player. He earned the nickname of "Flash" by his dashing style at the game. He has kept up his interest in local hockey, coaching minor teams, and is prominent in the town's Little N.H.L. organization. He is a member of the Bowmanville Arena Management Committee.

During World War II he served overseas in the Canadian Army. He enlisted in 1940, and saw action in France, Belgium, and Holland with the famous 48th Highlanders. He attained the rank of Quarter Master Sergeant. Mr. Rundle is president of Branch 173 of the Canadian Legion. He was re-elected for a second year in that office recently.

While the greater part of Mr. Rundle's Goodyear service has been in the Hose Room since November, 1959, he has been in the Stock Room. He has earned a fine reputation for his reliable workmanship.

Prior to joining the staff of Goodyear here Ted Clarke worked with his brother as a plumber. During his second week at the local plant Mr. Clarke transferred to Steamfitters. In 1935 he started

work in the Hose Room, and in March 1933, he transferred again to the Steamfitters and has been on this work since that time.

Mr. Clarke is interested in community work. He was an active member of the Bowmanville Boy Scout Association for many years, and is still a helper in this work. He is an executive member of the Goodyear Recreation Club, and takes an active part in club functions.

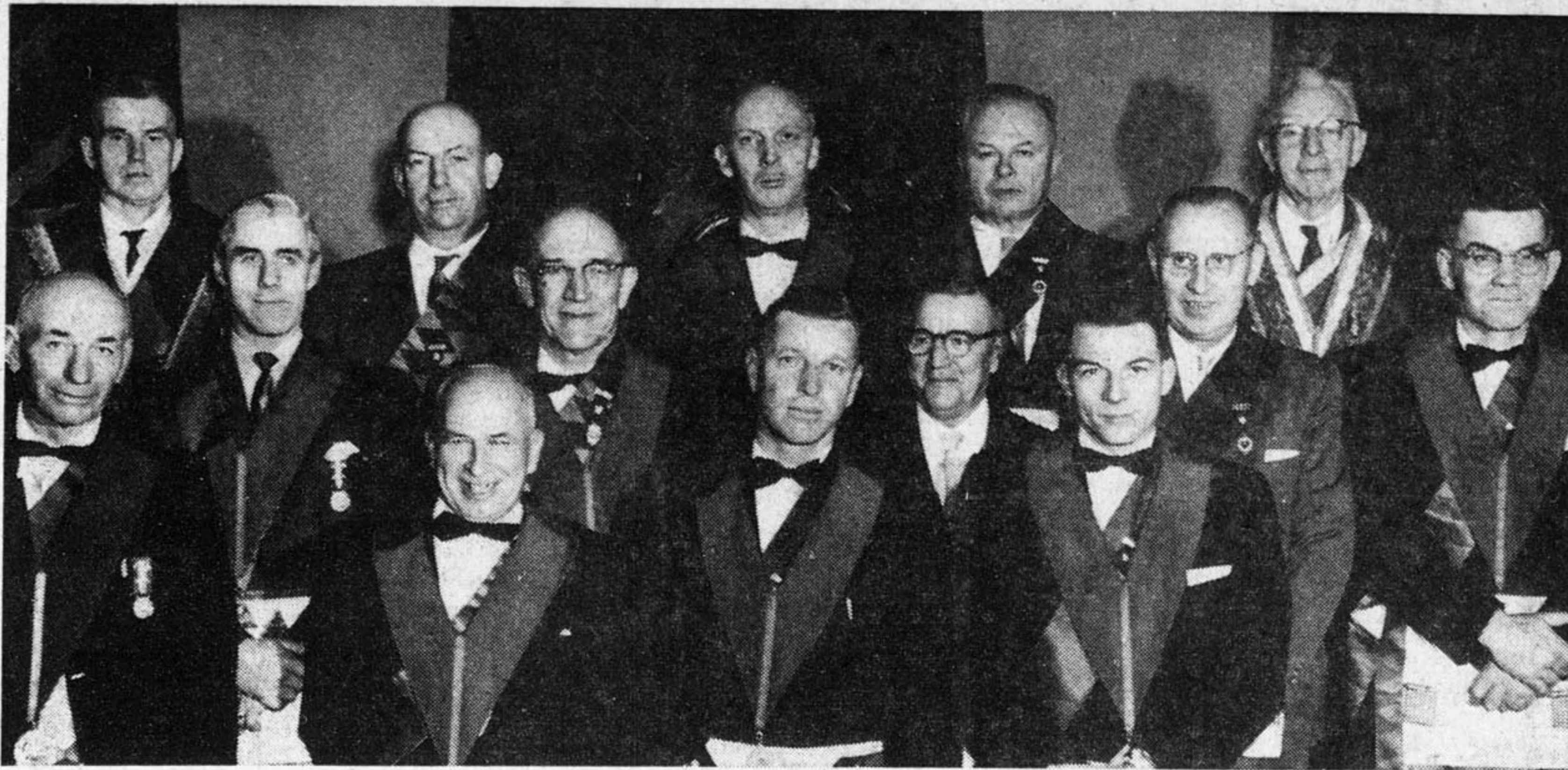

He told his fellow members of the Bowmanville Rotary Club that the committee had been able to obtain a number of educational coloured slides for the day's program from Rotary International through the assistance of the secretary, K. N. Morris, and the District-Governor.

Mr. Martin announced that Captain Norman Coles would be the narrator for the first half of the program, and Ross Gilbert for the second. He said that Tom Rehder would operate the projector.

"You know that Rotarians are a varied lot of men representing all the professions and most businesses, but what you may not realize is that we are all publishers", Captain Coles stated. He explained that the Rotarians in 113 countries are the publishers of the Rotarian, an excellent monthly magazine.

He spoke of the good accomplished by the magazine in far distant parts of the world. The narrator gave an instance of this in an account of a marvelous change for the better made in a small village in Malaya. The work achieved there for the welfare of the inhabitants had been undertaken by the Singapore Rotary Club which had been inspired by the account published in the Rotarian of a similar project successfully carried out by Rotarians in Krishnagar, India. A community centre, school, and club had been built, and assistance given to housing and medical projects, Captain Coles asserted.

He also told of the fine park shelter built by a Rotary Club in Queensland, Australia, the spark for which was lighted by an article in the Rotarian dealing with a successful park project of the Ottawa Rotary Club.

The Rotarian Magazine has a far flung and profound influence, and serves as an inspiration for service benefiting people of all classes and many nationalities, Capt. Coles pointed out.

Rotary International publishes two editions of the magazine each month, the Rotarian in English, and Revista Rotaria in Spanish, the
