

# Annual Vestry Meeting Held at Blackstock Church

The Annual Vestry Meeting of St. John's Church, Blackstock, (postponed from January 25th on account of bad weather conditions) was held in the Parish Hall on Monday, Feb. 1st, 1960 at 8 p.m. In spite of a rather cold evening there was a very fair attendance of members.

Canon Chaperlin occupied the chair, and the meeting was opened with appropriate prayers as well as remembrance before God of those who had "passed on" since the last vestry meeting, namely:—Mrs. Emily Parr, Mrs. Mabel Smith, Mrs. Florence Bateman, Mr. Roy Bone, Mrs. Maude Bailey and Mrs. Isabella Richardson.

Mr. George Wolfe was again re-elected as the Vestry Clerk, and the minutes of the last Vestry meeting were read and adopted.

Canon Chaperlin gave his report of the affairs of the Church during 1959, and offered his sincere thanks to all who had done so much and had worked so hard in various ways during the year. Special mention was made of the digging of the well, to provide water for the Rectory and Parish Hall, under the leadership of Mr. George Wolfe, and the many who gave their time and talents and strength for this work to be accomplished. The appeal of the Primate of the Anglican Church in Canada was

mentioned as worthy of good support, and it was stated that the new (revised) Prayer Book would be issued during this year, and used in the Church as soon as copies were available.

The Financial Report was given by Mr. George Wolfe, and after some questions had been asked and answered, he moved its adoption. This was seconded by Mrs. Scott and carried. It was noted, however, that the Assessment (for Synod purposes) and the Allotment (for the Mission Board) were increased for the year 1960.

Miss Eva Parr presented the report of the Envelope Secretary, and she was offered the thanks of the meeting for her good work in this special direction, and was re-elected as Envelope Secretary for the year.

Canon Chaperlin said that he wished to thank Mr. Frank Staniland for his good work as Rector's Warden since 1955, but stated that Mr. Staniland did not wish to be re-appointed for another year. He therefore appointed Mr. George Wolfe to be his Warden, and was glad that Mr. Wolfe had been good enough to say that he would accept the position. This was received with acclamation by the meeting.

The election of the People's Warden then took place. As several were nominated for the position it was decided

that the election take place by ballot. After the votes had been counted Canon Chaperlin announced that as Mr. Neil Bailey had received most votes he had therefore been elected as People's Warden.

Mr. Harry Hall was again re-elected as Lay Delegate to the Synod, and was heartily thanked for his past services, especially during last year when there were three occasions on which he was called to attend the Synod, including the matter of electing a Co-adjutor and a Suffragan Bishop for the Diocese. Mrs. Norma Wolfe and Mrs. Bessie Crawford were again re-elected as Auditors.

The following were appointed and/or elected as Sidesmen:—Messrs. F. Staniland, H. McLaughlin, J. Hamilton, H. Hamilton, H. Crawford and J. Green. The Cemetery Board was re-elected, namely, Mr. Fred Hamilton, Mr. N. Green, Mr. J. Hamilton, Mr. A. L. Bailey, Mr. H. McLaughlin and Mr. R. Brown.

Canon Chaperlin appointed the following as members of the Great Chapter of the Oshawa Deanery:—Messrs. F. Staniland, Lawrence McLaughlin, Jack Green, Harold Hamilton and Harold Crawford.

Reports of the various Church organizations were then presented, and all were adopted. They were:—Women's Auxiliary, by Mrs. F. Staniland; Girls' Auxiliary, by Mrs. H. McLaughlin; Junior Auxiliary, by Mrs. J. A. McArthur; Little Helpers, by Mrs. J. A. McArthur; Church Boy's League, by Mrs. Fred Hamilton; Sunday School, by Mrs. Fred Hamilton; A.Y.P.A. and Cemetery Board, by Mr. Fred Hamilton. All the reports showed that good and satisfactory work had been accomplished during the year, but the weak spots revealed would be looked into and strengthened by the capable leaders and perhaps others as well. All were warmly thanked for their consistent and devoted labours.

The following were appointed and/or elected as members of the Council:—Mr. Frank Staniland, Mr. J. Hamilton, Mr. C. Smith, Mr. H. Shemilt, Mr. J. Green and Mr. T. Hodge, and the representatives of the various Church organizations were approved as members of the Council:—Mrs. J. Hamilton for the W.A.; Mrs. H. Shemilt for the G.A.; Mrs. J. A. McArthur for the J.A.; Mrs. P. Chaperlin for the Little Helpers; Mrs. Fred Hamilton for the Church Boy's League; Mrs. Norma Wolfe for the Sunday School; Mrs. Lawrence McLaughlin for the A.Y.P.A.; and Mr. Fred Hamilton for the Cemetery Board.

Several important matters were then discussed by those present, and the meeting was adjourned after prayer and the benediction had been pronounced by Canon Chaperlin.

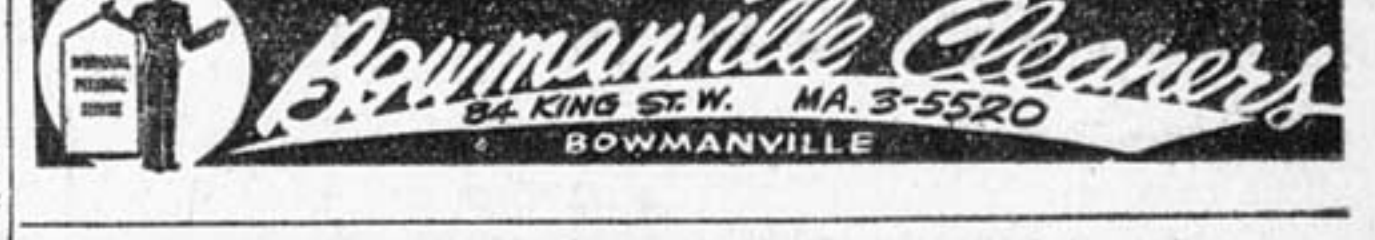

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# Heart Fund Opens Its Annual Campaign

The Canadian Heart Fund announced the opening of the 1960 campaign for \$1,246,000 today. During the month of February — Heart Month in Canada — corporations, businessmen, office workers and housewives are being asked to support the fight against heart disease, our country's Number One killer.

"We have every confidence that the Ontario objective of \$500,000 will be achieved," reported Martin Wills, campaign chairman of the Heart Fund's Ontario division. "Already, 16% of our quota has been attained, which is double the percentage we had reached at this time last year."

The greater portion of the monies received to date have been from corporations and employee groups with most gifts showing a 20% increase over last year.

Door-to-door canvasses will be held in the Toronto, Kingston and Gananoque areas on Heart Sunday, February 14th. In a two-hour blitz, members of the Ladies' Auxiliaries of the Canadian Legion will call on homes in Toronto, while in Kingston the canvass will be conducted by students of Queen's University.

Almost 75% of the \$1,246,000 quota is earmarked for research to develop more accurate tools for diagnosis, new drugs and surgery techniques.

"The Heart Fund is not a charity," Mr. Wills said. "All of us have a stake in the fight against heart disease. Our support of the Canadian Heart Fund will help our medical scientists to conquer another enemy of mankind."

Planning for the forthcoming Annual Meeting of the Bay of Quinte Conference W.A. occupied an important place on the agenda when the Executive met in the United Church at Shannonville on Monday, February 1st, the president, Mrs. G. W. Dobbs of Belleville in the chair.

An invitation from the W.A. of Chalmers United Church, Kingston, to hold the annual meeting there, was accepted, the date selected for a two-day conference being May 2nd and 3rd. Mrs. W. G. MacLean of Kingston was appointed to receive requests for billets for all overnight delegates to be provided by Chalmers W.A. Registration will begin at 2 p.m. and opening devotions at 2.30 p.m.

Guest speakers to be invited from Dominion Council W.A. will include Mrs. J. Y. McKinnon, President, with Mrs. J. L. Halpenny, Past-president as alternate; suggested topic will be "women's work—the New Organization". Mrs. Geo. Paul, Programme Planning Secretary for Dominion Council W.A. will be asked to give guidance in programming in W.A. Also Mrs. B. H. Soper, President of Bay of Quinte W.M.S. will be invited to speak. The theme chosen for the Conference is "A Changeless Christ in a Changing World".

A Springtime Retreat at Five Oaks Training Centre for Oshawa, Lindsay, Cobourg and Belleville Presbyteries is planned for March 1, 2 and 3; transportation will cost \$5, and room and board for three days \$7. # Medical Mirror

**Manipulating Human Behavior**

Several months ago news stories told of a new method of advertising called "invisible selling." Can the mind actually be influenced without a person being aware of it?

A Subliminal projection ("invisible self") is a technique familiar to psychologists. It consists in brief showings of material such as a soap box on a T-V screen or movie screen. The images can be perceived by the individual without his being consciously aware of it. The device used to flash the brief exposure is the tachistoscope, a gadget which is one of the oldest pieces of hardware in the psychological laboratory. The promoters of this type of advertising claim that it will "sell." Psychologists are more concerned with whether the method — assuming that it works as an advertising gimmick — should be used at all. One scientist has said that playing with the control of human behavior is more risky and terrifying than touching off atomic bombs.
