It had not been used. Reeve Cunningham explained that a two year term could be passed by council on the same terms as the present council, all elected at once, but a staggered term must be decided by the municipal electors. Councillor Rickard, who proposed the resolution stated his only reason for wanting a two year term was for continuity of council, so that all members of council could not be voted out of office in the same election with a complete slate of inexperienced councillors taking over the reins.

This new plan would work the same as the present School Board and Hydro Commission where half are elected each year for a two year term thus ensuring continuity of the administration of the business started the previous year.

The building inspector, Geo. Meadows, tendered his resignation and there was some discussion on a replacement with several names being mentioned but it was decided to think it over before making a decision. Councillors renewed the lease for village owned property with Miss C. Butler for her cottage at the lake for another three year term, and a grant of \$5.00 was authorized for the Salvation Army.

After some discussion it was decided to write to the village auditors informing them that if they intended to audit the village books this year they had better get at it immediately as some books must be audited before March 1st. In order to receive Government Grants and that the council must strike their rate in March this year.

In answer to correspondence from the Atlas Asbestos Co. makers of water mains, council decided to meet with representatives of the company on February 16th when the company's products will be demonstrated to members of the council. While speaking on this subject, Councillor Rickard reported he had been in touch with the Water Resources Commission and was told the waterworks information in the hands of the Municipal Board was in the hands of the Municipal Board. On contacting the Board was unable to find what the delay was in arranging the local Board Hearing.

A letter was received from the Newcastle Chamber of Commerce, urging immediate action on construction of the local Waterworks system.

Dogs Again

Stray dogs are causing worry for the councillors again, Councillor Hoar mentioning the number of stray dogs around the school and Reeve Cunningham stating he had received complaints. The reeve

said he had been in touch with a member of the Bowmanville council with regard to joining in with the Bowmanville Dog Control system and had been informed he would have to send a letter to the Bowmanville Council. A resolution was passed instructing the clerk to write to the Bowmanville council seeking information regarding the dog control system and asking whether it would be possible for this village to join in the system.

On the request of community hall caretaker Stanley Powell for one full day per week off it was increased by councillors that discovering Sunday meetings were making his a seven day per week job. Council decided they should have a meeting with the community hall board in order to reassess the whole question of community hall responsibility; where does the council responsibility end and the community hall responsibility start. It is hoped to be able to straighten out a number of items at this proposed joint meeting.

The meeting adjourned about midnight to resume to settle several uncompleted matters at the call of the reeve.
