Salary Increases Feature Darlington Council Session

Darlington Township Council at the meeting held in the Township Hall, Hampton, on Thursday, February 18th, decided to purchase an International truck with Eastern Steel attachment from Cowan Equipment Ltd., Bowmanville. Five tenders were received.

The price of the new truck will be \$8775, the second lowest tender received. A tender from the former Reeve of Darlington, Roy W. Nichols, which arrived at the municipal office after the hour when tenders were closed was returned unopened.

Walter Rundle, the Township Clerk was instructed to advertise for tenders to crush and stock-pile 10,000 yards of gravel. Closing date for these tenders will be March 16th.

Gerry Estabrooks acting fire Chief of the Darlington Township Volunteer Fire Brigade No. 1 informed the council of the money raised by the group, the truck and equipment paid for and the plans for a building in which to house the truck.

He stated that the township now pays Bowmanville about \$2,500 annually, but explained that if the taxes collected in the brigade's area were returned to the brigade the building could be bought and maintained.

Council instructed the legislation and by-laws committee to obtain further information on the subject, and to arrange for a meeting of people interested in fire protection, and to report back to council.

Road Rate 16 Mills
The Council stuck its 1960 road rate at 16 mills. One mill will represent \$6,097 and council is setting \$85,264 aside for

road work. The account of C. A. Meadows and Associates, Toronto, for preliminary planning in connection with the proposed CPR overpass south of Courtice, in the amount of \$2,800 was passed for payment.

A by-law to ban the disposal of refuse in Darlington was given the necessary three readings and approved. It includes penalties to be imposed for any breaches.

The Township Council with Councillor Sidney Cornish in opposition voted to increase the salary of W. L. Lycett, the assessor to \$4,000 a year plus an annual car allowance of \$1,000.

Walter Rundle was appointed Clerk, treasurer, and Tax collector, and secretary-treasurer of the Planning Board at a salary of \$5,250 per year plus a \$250 yearly car allowance.

Miss Mary Nidderly was appointed deputy clerk-treasurer and deputy tax collector at an annual salary of \$3,320.

R. M. (Max) Short was appointed roads superintendent at a yearly salary of \$5500 plus \$500 for keeping the roads department accounts and 10 cents a mile car allowance.

E. A. Varcoe the building inspector, had his annual salary set at \$3,300. He also is to receive \$100 a month for acting as welfare administrator until the return of J. D. Hogarth.

W. R. Pickel's appointment as weed inspector at an annual salary of \$100 plus 10 cents a mile car allowance.

Give More Study
Councillor Glenholme Hughes said he was not in disagreement with the motion but would like to ask if one man is to have the power to commit the municipality here a \$100,000 expenditure. The Town Council should have time to study the motion, a decision should not be given in three or four minutes, he asserted.

Prospect Loses Interest
Councillor Nicks stated that the Industrial Commissioner's hands are tied if a prospect comes to him, escorted to see the available land, and when he asks about services the Commissioner is not able to give a straight answer. The prospect loses interest and goes to another locality, he added.

Councillor O. J. Presson said he would like to go more thoroughly in the dollars and cents of the matter. The financial status of a company could be established and some financial limit considered as a \$25,000 industry would not warrant a huge expenditure. The growth potential is unknown, he remarked.

A communication was received from the Township of Crowland asking Bowmanville Town Council to support a resolution of Crowland's to petition the Provincial Government to enact legislation whereby any municipality proposing to annex another must bear the cost not only of its own proceedings, but also the cost of the defence should the application be unsuccessful.

Councillor O. J. Presson expressed the opinion that it would be unfair for the cost of the defence to have to be borne by a municipality making application for the annexation of another. He said that he thought it would be wrong to give support to such an idea, and moved that the letter be received and filed. The motion was seconded by Councillor Hughes and carried.

Wants Dog Catcher
A request from the Newcastle Municipal Council regarding the possibility of hiring the Bowmanville Dog Catcher part time for the village was received at the meeting of Bowmanville Town Council held in the Council Chamber on Monday evening.

On motion of Councillor Ross Stevens, chairman of the Dog Control Committee, seconded by Councillor O. J. Presson, this matter was referred to the committee so that further information could be obtained on the Newcastle By-laws as to whether or not they conform to the Bowmanville Dog Control By-law.

The Dog Control Report for January was submitted to council. It showed that 40 animals had been picked up, 35 dogs and five cats. During the month 14 dogs and two cats were destroyed, and 14 dogs

were returned to their owners. Five dogs were sold, and two cats were given to owners. One dog was boarded at \$1.00 per day.

Dr. Wheatley, the Dog Control Officer, also reported that numerous investigations had been made in January. Eight licenses were sold. There were no rabies suspects held for observation.

The Town Clerk, R. B. Reynolds, said that quite a number of dog licenses had been sold at the office in the Town Hall. He pointed out that the 1960 Dog Licence period extends from January 1st, 1960, until the end of the year.
