### FIVE-PIN GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

Did you know that 1960 commemorates the Golden Anniversary of 5-pin bowling? Thomas Ryan of Toronto created the game in 1909 to satisfy the Toronto Bowling Club's desire for a faster, less strenuous game than 10 pins. He made the pins smaller, cut their number in half, and substituted a smaller ball.

The fast and lighter game was approved quickly and in 1910 the first 5-pin league was organized and soon spread across Canada. The first known perfect score was rolled in 1921 by Bill Bromfield.

Everyone in Bowmanville is well acquainted with Alfie Shrubb's racing records, but this reporter was surprised to find Mr. Shrubb's name in bowling history, also. "The first recorded game having a score of over 400 was bowled in 1918 by Alfred Shrubb, a famous English long-distance runner, then living in Canada".

Don't forget to enter the "Masters" 5-Pin World Championship, open to all male bowlers. Qualifying rounds of 10 games will be bowled at Liberty Bowl, with no entry fee required. First prize is an Austin Healy sports car and \$1,000.00 cash. That's not the Liberty Bowl prize, but the winner of the final round at O'Connor Bowl in Toronto.
