Closer to home, a rabid skunk was found recently at Enniskillen and other infected animals have been located on the outskirts of Oshawa and in other parts of the county.

Citizens are again advised to warn their children against picking up or having anything to do with animals that are acting in an unusual manner. Parents are also urged to seek medical treatment immediately should they or their children suffer a bite from a strange animal or even their own domestic pet.
