Lions Dist. Governor Urges Newcastle Club To Practise Service

Newcastle — "The Lions Club with one or more projects underway will have no trouble gaining new members or retaining the old members," Dr. R. E. Jamieson of Cobocok, District Governor of Lions International told members of the Newcastle Lions Club at their dinner meeting in the Lions room of the Newcastle community hall on Thursday evening.

Introduced by the District Deputy Governor, Lion Brenton Rickard as one of the busiest men he knew, having a rural medical practice in the Coboconk district with his nearest hospital in Lindsay, he is never too busy to do Lions work or to attend the meetings of his club. Dr. Jamieson said some members of Lions Clubs like to come for dinner and enjoy the fellowship of the club and have a nice social time, but such members are no asset to a club because they are just not good Lions.

The speaker explained that a Lions Club is a service and though the social activities of the club are important, the main function is service to the community. He said though some people may patronize a business because it is run by a Lion, there is no guarantee of personal profit by being a member of a Lions Club. It is not a fraternal organization and a Lions Club to be successful must be actively engaged in service to the community.

In closing, the district governor quoted the well known poem "It Couldn't Be Done" and said a good Lion will always take the moral of the poem seriously and say it couldn't be done but we'll do it. He said clubs that take on projects in this spirit will find they soon have lots of active members and will be doing great work in the community.

He said if every member of every Lions Club throughout the world would believe that all men everywhere are brothers and act accordingly it would speed the day when goodwill will be established throughout the world.
