Local Lawyer At Conference In Chicago

Newcastle—A conference on Criminal Law Administration held in Chicago February 19th and 20th, one of a series being held on the "Preservation of a Free Society Under Law", conducted by the Northwestern University School of Law in observance of its 100th anniversary was attended by E. Richard Lovekin of Newcastle on the weekend.

Lectures and panel discussions conducted by prominent criminal lawyers from eight countries and included G. Arthur Martin, Q.C., a member of the bars of Ontario and British Columbia and lecturer in criminal law and procedure at the Osgoode Hall Law School in Toronto, Law Professor from Canada, England, France, Germany, Israel, Japan, Norway and the United States participated in the conference which opened at 9:00 a.m. on Friday and held four sessions.

Objectives of the conference were to analyze and discuss the laws and rules currently prevailing in the United States and to evaluate such laws and rules in the light of practices and procedures followed in other countries.
