One hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars worth of silver and large quantities of copper coins were recently received at the Finance Department in Ottawa, and distributed to the various Provinces, to be given to the banks as required.

Judgment was rendered last week by Mr. Justice Gait, at the Toronto Assizes in the case of the Toronto v. The Toronto Colonization Society, dismissing the plaintiff's action with costs, and giving judgment in favor of the defendants on their counterclaim for about \$55,000 on unpaid calls.

A London cablegram announces that the President of the Board of Trade has investigated and found that the Oregon carried her full complement of boats. It has been discovered, however, that she had on board only 120 cork life jackets and 600 life buoys. Thus if every one of the passengers had been saved, there would have been compelled to rely on these agencies for escape from a watery grave, nearly three hundred would have been drowned.
