

## WHAT DOCTORS SAY ABOUT **Bursitis Can** Be Helped



Q. Will you please write about calcified bursitis?-C.B. A. All joints are padded with fluid-filled sacs called bursae (singular-bursa). In the accompanying drawing the bursae of the knee joint have been drawn so that they can be clearly seen. Inflammation of a bursa (bursitis) is often preceded by injury to the joint. Long continued irritation may lead to deposits of gravellike calcium within the bursa. Doctors are sometimes able to break up the deposits without much trouble. Injections are also employed plus x-ray treatment. In some cases it may be necessary to surgically open the bursa and remove the deposits. Heat, massage, and gentle stretching as pre-


