He further explained that if \$100,000 were borrowed early in the year and paid back within a short time, and further amounts were rowed and paid back, the total of such borrowings would count in limiting the amount that could be borrowed even for one month at the end of

the year. He said the taxpayers of Bowmanville have ample opportunity to save by prepay-ing the second installment with the first to receive a one percent discount. If the third installment of taxes is paid with the first two, a two per cent discount would be given on it, and three per cent if all installments are paid together.

PUC Helped Out

If a discount larger than three per cent were allowed it would be cheaper to go to the bank, Mr. Reynolds asserted. "We give two percent for the first 14 days of the year and before the first installment is due in 106 days. this means about 14 percent of saving," The Town Clerk pointed out. He remarked that "the PUC knowing the town needed the money gave us \$24,000 now to save us interest, although their debenture is not due until April."


