

National Electrical Week February 7 - 13, 1960

As Canada celebrates National Electrical Week, Feb. 7-13, under the banner of "Electricity Sparks the '60s", citizens of Ontario can look to Hydro to help them achieve a better way of life during the next decade—through an abundance of low-cost electric power.

Homeowners and homemakers in this most densely populated of all the provinces, will be offered an increasing number and variety of time-saving, work-eliminating electric appliances and equipment. In addition, home improvements such as ultrasonic lighting, mural television, panel lights, electrostatic dusting wands, and ultra-modern heating and cooling systems will probably be in general use.

Before the Centennial of Canada as a Dominion in 1967,

it may be possible for the man of the house to discard that instrument of torture, the snow shovel. He will merely flip a switch and lean back watching the snow melt as fast as it falls, thanks to the cables carrying electricity under his driveway. In the not too distant future he may be able to bring his electronically steered car from his garage to his door without getting out of his chair.

However, it is in the kitchen that the real revolution will come. The kitchen of the future will be built around four units, each with an electrically refrigerated drawer, for storing, preparing and cooking the family's meals.

Dishwashers will remove all grease and matter from dishes and utensils within seconds by means of high-

pressure sound waves which will agitate the water. All types of garbage will be pulverized into disposable powder by a compact electric incinerator. A small electronic memory or brain may be available to housewives to retain and give information on menus and recipes.

By pressing the appropriate button, the housewife will get a punched card with instructions stamped on it. She will insert this card in the slot of her multi-storage cupboard and all the necessary ingredients will be automatically measured out. An electric mixer will then take over, and finally, the card will instruct the oven on the cooking procedure.

There will be extensive use of home freezers and irradiated foods, capable of being stored for several years. Fly swatters will be collected as antiques, as homes, commerce, and industry, (especially large dairies), will use electric fly traps. Electric toilet systems will eliminate sewage disposal plants, while home precipitators will rid us of all domestic dust and dirt.

In the bedrooms of tomorrow a radiant heating pad will be suspended above the bed to keep sleepers comfortable without blankets. The panel may include a TV monitor screen to enable parents to keep a close watch on junior in the nursery. Electrical heating and cooling systems will provide year-round residential air-conditioning.

But behind the switches of this wide array of new appliances, important developments will be taking place in the supply of power to the people of Ontario.

With the urban development of Ontario, the municipal electric utilities associated with Ontario Hydro in the distribution of electricity, will maintain a steady expansion of residential and industrial services.

In mid-1961, Canada's first nuclear-electric power will flow into Hydro's Southern Ontario transmission network. This power will be indistinguishable from energy produced by presently conventional means, but it will be symbolic of the quiet revolution in power production in the '60s.

In late 1964 or early 1965, the first full-scale nuclear power station will be in operation in Ontario.

Uranium, a mineral in which the province is rich, will be used as a fuel to an increasing degree as nuclear energy begins to play an important part in Hydro's generating pattern.

New hydraulic developments will help to meet some of the power requirements of the '60s, and side by side with such projects will be the innovation of the extra-high-

voltage transmission of power from many of the province's more remote sites. To carry the output from these isolated sites, (it is estimated that 2,000,000 kilowatts of hydraulic power is still undeveloped), Hydro is planning an EHV network in Northeastern Ontario, which will transmit power at 460,000 volts—double the present highest voltage used in Ontario.

The coming decade will bring many changes, but the aims of both Ontario Hydro and local electrical utilities will remain the same: to provide a constant and abundant supply of electric power to the homes, farms, and factories of Ontario.

The reports heard from all the groups denoted a year of progress and an increase in church attendance. Mrs. Walter Rowland, the retiring church treasurer, reported all accounts paid and a balance on hand in the general treasury.

Mrs. Henry Jakeman and Mrs. T. Jackson outlined the work of the Women's Missionary Society, who had sent \$226.90 to Presbytery headquarters, an increase of \$16.90 over their allocation. With a membership of 17 they had sent two bales of clothing and quilts, sponsored a delegate to the Teachers' Training School at Whitby. They had studied missions and conditions in North America, Korea and Africa.

Mrs. O. Spencer gave the account of the Sunday School finances and Murray Henderson, the secretarial reports, showing all supplies paid for and an increase in attendance.

Earl Weatherill and Mervyn Porteous are the joint superintendents, with Allan Beer as Assistant, Teachers are Mrs. Vincent Jackson, Mrs. Murray Wilson, Mrs. Ross Davidson, Mrs. Preston Neals, Mrs. Mervyn Porteous and Mrs. Edgar Beer; secretaries, Murray Henderson and John Jackson; treasurer Mrs. O. Spencer; Mrs. Clarence Rowan in charge of the missionary lessons and Mrs. O. Spencer for Temperance. A new Young People's Class had been organized, with Mrs. Allan Beer as Teacher.

George Scott reported for the Hi-C group who have a membership of 14. During the year they had sold Christmas cards, painted the floor of the church basement, entered a Float in the Athletic Field Day Parade, assisted in several church services and paid for half of the newly installed public address system, with a balance on hand of \$27.03. Their newly elected President, Murray Henderson expressed thanks to Rev. R. R. Bonsteel and Mrs. Borsteel, through whose efforts the group was organized last year and special thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Allan Beer who are now the Counsellors for the group. "They are doing a terrific job in acting as our advisors and teaching our Young People's Sunday School class. Their home is always open to us and they are teaching us the real meaning of being part of a church group."

Mrs. S. L. Speller reported 18 members in the choir with an average attendance of 12. Along with their regular church work they had assisted in special services at other points on the Manvers circuit and held a special Christmas carol service. She expressed pleasure in the new organ installed on October 4th, 1959 and announced a coming musical evening to be held in the church on February 5th, when the Coventry Singers of Peterborough will put on a program. Proceeds will assist in payment of the balance on the organ.

Clarence Rowan reported for the Graham Cemetery Board, who have a balance on hand of \$1,076.78.
