

Here's what to look for: Spark plugs which are dirty, improperly gapped or which have poor insulators. Or it could be in your distributor. Perhaps the spark is overadvanced or retarded ... the points burnt or not gapped correctly ... the coil weak . . . or dirty or loose wiring in the

Another major contributor to loss of power is the carburetion system. The mixture may be too lean, which means that your idle jet is set improperly . . . or there may be dirt in the jets. Both of these "ailments" are causes of a lean mixture. On the other hand if the mixture is too rich the trouble probably lies in a clogged air cleaner or a high float level. Other things to look for include - a clogged fuel pump screen, sticking manifold temperature regulator, worn accelorator pump, faulty enrichment jet or leaks along the throttle plate shaft.

The other cause of loss of power - which is low compression — can be a result of stuck. burnt or warped valves . . . improper tappet clearance or worn piston rings.
