RECKONER—No. 7.
Prima mihi debet animi bona.—JUVENAL.

TO THE RECKONER.
 SIR—Do not think it a degradation to your respectable paper, that a prodigal son requests room to make all the reparation to a world justly offended by his conduct, that his present miserable situation admits. If fictitious stories incite to virtue, how much more the narrations that are true.

My father, Mr. Reckoner, was a respectable merchant in London, trading to the W. Indies, who had no son but your unhappy correspondent. This circumstance proved my ruin, for my parents foolishly resolved never to contradict me. He has no brothers or sisters, they would say, to entertain him; let us not then abide his little enjoyments with absurd restrictions. Even the most necessary discipline may be dispensed with, as it will be very easy to bring him into order when his reason begins to open. By these sage resolutions, my childhood was guided; and tho' they intended to make me happy, they were far from being successful. My temper became every day more and more turbulent, and was not only vexatious to all our domestics, but a continual torment to myself. Years passed rapidly away, and I had not acquired the very first elements of knowledge. The school I conceived a most intolerable restraint, and the more odious because instead of being treated with distinction, I was exposed every hour to the most humiliating comparisons. When I contrasted these vexations with the unbounded indulgences which I received at home, I contrived numerous excuses of absence, which very easily succeeded with my fond parents. Left entirely to myself; I became at length so troublesome that even my father began to doubt the propriety of the plan of indulgence to which he had so rigidly adhered; but unwilling to make any alteration, he obtained my mother's consent to send me to a respectable public school in the country. He was in hopes that my distance from home and the strict discipline of this celebrated seminary, would produce the most beneficial amendments. It is probable that these good consequences would have followed, had they not been prevented by an indulgence no less common than pernicious, viz. a liberal allowance of pocket money. O! Mr. Reckoner, tell your readers that if boys have money it must be expended, and if it be more than sufficient to purchase toys and sweet-meats, it will be spent to their destruction. No strictness or attention on the part of the masters can guard against the evils which pocket money introduces. Here the parents set in opposition to the teacher, and they become the corrupters of their own children. My wealth enabled me to become popular with a certain class of my school-fellows, who not only kept my idleness in countenance, but consoled me, by their flatteries, for the disgraces to which my gross inattention daily exposed me.—They paid with praise for the pleasures which I procured them.

Having been convicted of several trespasses, and private admonitions failing to produce any amendment, the rector of the school informed my father that I must be removed, or that he should be under the disagreeable necessity of expelling me with disgrace. On my return home, my assertions of innocence joined to plausible falsehoods, induced my credulous parents to believe that the rector had taken a rooted dislike to me for some trifling matters unworthy of his notice.—Their fondness did not allow them to perceive that the head master of a respectable school in England is incapable of any thing mean or unbecoming. I had by this time become a great adept in lying, for I considered it a useful qualification, from the time that my excuses to stay away from my first school succeeded so well.

I was now removed to a private academy, where I lived in perfect freedom; the master had become popular by his extreme indulgence—he professed to teach without punishments, and his house was filled with spoiled children. Here I learned new methods of destroying time and some new vices, but being now seventeen, and possessing good natural parts, I condescended to give some attention to arithmetic and accounts. The specimens, however, which my master exhibited, with so much parade, to my father, were principally done by himself, a circumstance
