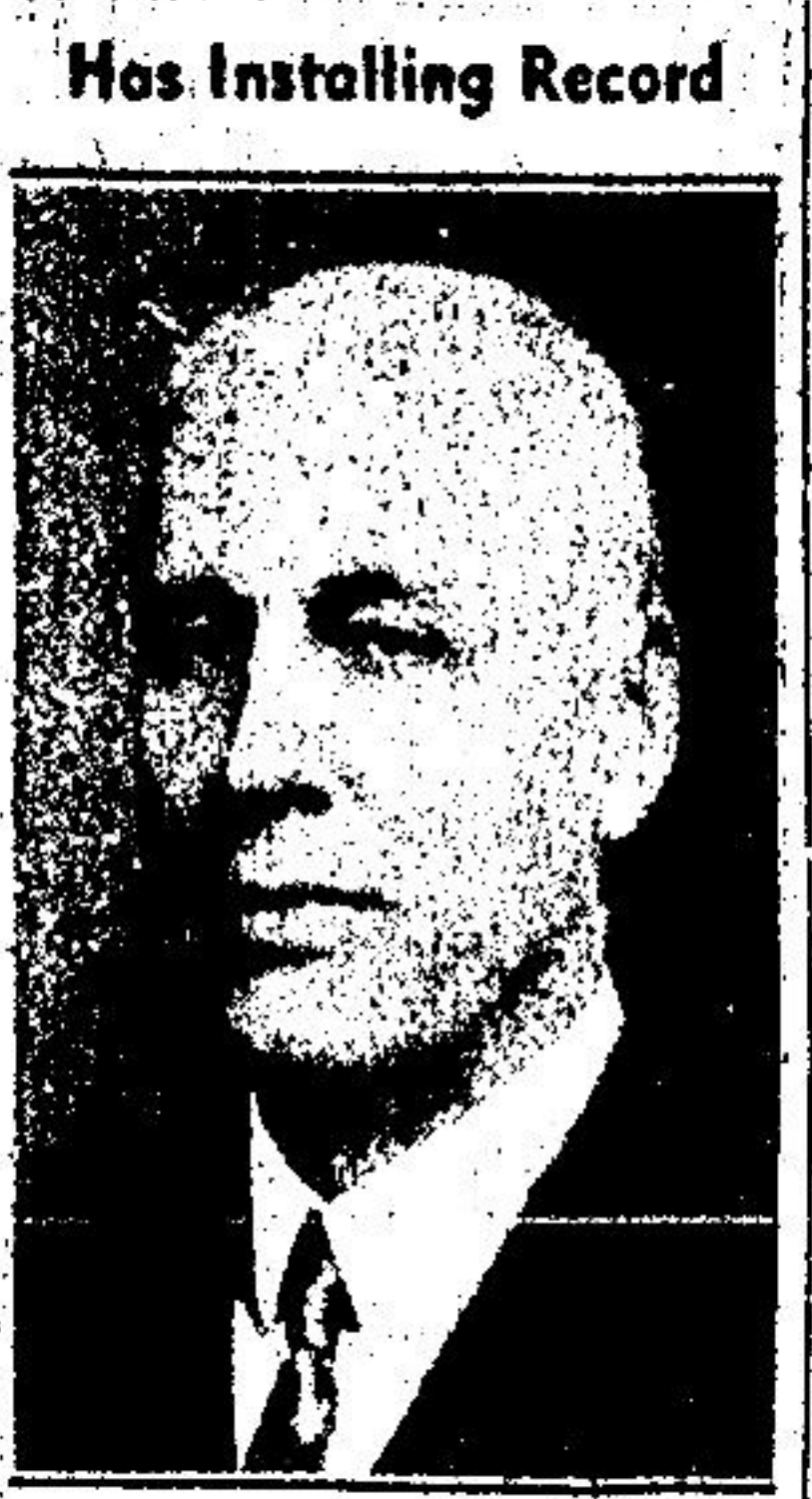

Eric Simpson Wins In Three-Cornered in Tiny

Simcoe County Council, when it meets here on January 16, will have ten changes in its membership of 46 from 1939. Three of the ten served previously in the County Council within the past five years, while seven others are absolutely new to the County body.

The three who served previously are ex-Warden Jno. Carlon, Beaton; Dermott McNabb, Stayner; and Harry Wright, Deputy Reeve of Midland. The seven new men are: Dennis O'Leary, Adajala; James A. Kerr, Alliston; William Garner, Deputy Reeve of Barrie; William McLeod, Deputy Reeve of Nottawasaga; Perry G. Yale, Deputy Reeve of Orillia; W. R. Benson, Penetangushene; William J. Wray, Tottenham.

Chief interest in Innisfil was the election for deputy Reeve between the sitting deputy, Harry Reynolds, and Coun. Thomas Cook. The former won the fight by 583 to 555, a majority of 28, by piling up a margin of 58 at Thornton, and 117 at Stroud.

Cliff Lockhart, who came third a year ago, led the poll for councillors with 707, a margin of 61 over Dalton Banting, who was second last year. Wilbert Black, who ran last year ago, was in third place. John M. Hunter was defeated, Lockhart led in seven polls out of eleven.

New Trustees Named. Oro Township saw a battle for three council seats and five places on the new Township School area "A" board, John A. Woodrow again headed the poll for Council with 522 votes, as against 533 a year ago. He counted a uniformly good vote throughout the township. A new man, Albert H. Shellsell, was second with 471, and the third man was Cecil J. Chappell with 221. He served in the 1939 Council. Norman R. Stoddart with 260, ran fourth.

There was considerable excitement in the school board election. Bartholomew, Smith Campbell, J. D. Gilchrist and W. P. Woodrow running in that order. There was a tie vote for fifth place, John H. Caldwell and Robert Caldwell each getting 62. W. P. Tudhope, the returning officer, gave a casting vote to John H. Caldwell. It is understood that Robert Caldwell may be the new secretary.

Simpson Wins In Tiny. H. Eric Simpson scored a decisive win for the deputy Reeve of Tiny Township when he defeated Albert Beletout and Archie Edwards in a three-cornered fight. His plurality over Beletout, the second man, was 186. Simpson had 486, Beletout 298, and Edwards 276. Simpson led in four of the seven polls, turning an adverse majority of 90 at Wyebridge into a favorable one of three. A year ago, Simpson squeezed out 15 majority in a straight fight with Edwards when the polling was much tighter than this year.

Council seats went to Arthur Gardner with 557, Stephen Desroches with 498, and a former Reeve, W. S. Robins, with 313. Defeated were Arthur Marchildon with 301, and John Watson with 279.

One Change In Toorontio. Toorontio Township re-elected Robert Dermott Reeve over Van Loree with a majority of 93 as compared with last year's 60. Dalton McCracken, Charles Lowery and David McGill were returned as councillors, while Herbert Madill was also defeated. McCracken, with 305, again headed the poll, while Lowery moved up from third to second place. Crosbie took third, and McGill fourth.
