These essentials, the Board points out, can be attained by choosing breeding stock with care by feeding properly, by marketing hogs at suitable weight and finish and by following the best practices in swine husbandry and herd man-

Producers are recommended prepare now for healthy and vigorous litters by providing brood rows with adequate care. The way the pregnant sow is fed and managed from breeding to farrowing has a definite effect on the health and vigor of the litter at farrow-\$14.95 ing. Housing need not be claborate, but it should be dry and free \$23.55 from drafts and bedding should be plentiful. 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
