GRAVENHURST WINS GAME 5-4

Indians Take Advantage Of Numerous Camp Penalties. PLAYED LAST NIGHT. Scoring the odd goal in the last period after the first two stanzas were tied, Gravenhurst's speedy Indians beat Camp Borden Fliers at Barrie Arena last night 5-4, in a thrilling O.H.A. intermediate match. . . . The first period ended 2-2, the third 3-3, but Indians took advantage of a penalty to Dave Harding midway through the last frame to go in front when Don McDonald staged a nice long rush through the weary defenders. A few minutes later Scelt scored with a shot from the blue line which Hook failed to see in the mix-up of bodies around the net. . . . That proved to be the winning goal, Fliers battled desperately in the last five minutes and finally Anderson took a pass from Brett to score. In the last two minutes Dickson - of Gravenhurst - drew a penalty and Fliers stormed in but had no luck. Both Day and Gallop missed open chances when in alone with only the goalie to beat. . . . Fliers presented a new star forward, "Toots" Day, formerly of Orillia Senators and Toronto Fliers, both senior teams. He came to the camp the day before and played on borrowed skates. Dave Harding was also in action again and played a steady defensive game but drew down three penalties. Day was the best man on the ice, a real speedster who knows all the answers. Malloy on right wing and Mulverhill on defence were also standouts. . . . McDonald was Gravenhurst's best bet. The former Sutton speedster was a constant threat. All the Indians' forwards were fast and they also presented a hard-hitting defence foursome and a steady goalie in Clem Dwyer.
