## COLTS TIE TORONTO KINGSWAY 4-4

The hockey meeting to throat out differences regarding groupings and the schedule, held in the Queen's Hotel here last week, started sharp at 8 p.m. and threatened to last all night.

The Barrie delegates, followed closely by the Midland representatives, disliked very much the idea of Owen Sound being in the group at all and when nothing could be done about that, they objected strenuously to having to take the long trip to the Grey city.

So strenuous were the objections that an hour had passed and still nothing definite had been arrived at. Chairman John Dobson was becoming most uneasy when Ab Hulse of Aurora applied oil to the troubled waters.

He stated that as far as his club and the Kingsway entry were concerned they could play out a schedule of their own and let the Georgian Bay loop work things out for themselves. However, Aurora and the Toronto Suburbans wanted more games to season their teams and if satisfactory arrangements could be made they would like to be included in this league.

A motion was finally put to the committee to the effect that Midland, Barrie, Aurora and Kingsway, play an interlocking double schedule with each team meeting Owen Sound in a home-and-home series and that both groups retain their identity.

Very grudgingly, Secretary Hedger and Manager Bob Bibby of the Barrie executive admitted the set-up was workable, although they still did not like the trip north, Bill Garbutt of the Greys moaned about the nearness of home games that would be getting and appealing for more, to which the Aurora men replied that dates for third and fourth meetings might be arranged.

There was a bit of spirited conversation between the Barrie and Owen Sound lads but the prize fight of the night went to Ralph Robinson of the locals. Owen Sound was scheduled for a game in Aurora on January 8, when Hedger snipes up with the suggestion that Barrie come to play in the Sound on the 9th. Suddenly realizing that three Barrie boys in two nights was a little bit much, Doug, attempted to retract the statement when Garbutt broke in, saying, "Well take you mean, A. Hoop! Jones followed and then the drawed remark, "Do you think you'll be home in time," from Treasurer Robinson.

The complete schedule will be decided by the Junior D, but it was decided that the team finishing last in the northern group would have the option of continuing in C competition.

A sentence from "Sport Jottings" in the Orillia News Letter caught our eye this week. It read, "It is an old, old story... history is full of records where clubs have won championships with castoffs from their teams." That sentence was used following disparaging remarks about Harold Spence leaving this town and the departure of Elgin McLeod, who is now with Lucknow in intermediates.

The News-Letter writer is evidently laboring under the impression that McLeod is a Barrie boy, for he continues with, "Apparently Barrie in its enthusiasm to get a winning hockey team, is making the old mistake of centering all attention on imports and ignoring the good talent right at home."

McLeod was one of those imports mentioned above, but he failed to reduce anything that the local lads couldn't match. So he was shipped back to his home town, Morant, who by the way, was not brought to Barrie but came here as he asked to try out, and was left after parts for the same reason, which leaves Barrie with one bona-fide import, Paul Paquette.

As for Harold Spence, his talents were not overlooked. He is a product of the Barrie church leagues and last season played with the Lions C team. As far as we know he never turned out with the Colts while he was here. This season he doubtless would have made a place with the Barrie team had he stayed. And while we are still on the subject, it is an old, old story... the reporter who colors his news and interprets stories the way he wants to. (News-Letter please note) For The Examiner has never implied that Spence was not a luss to Barrie hockey.

We gave Orillia all credit for adding the Colts, the 3-0 pasting and Spence much of the praise for victory. The lites of the Orillia team taking the Barrie C outfit out a disgrace since we are really adding our team. The Barrie executive does not want C hockey in town and made no effort to have the Colts reduced to such ratings despite the possible weakness of the team, while Orillia is apparently crowding about being in the low class and able to step up and meet the Colts. ### Visitors Wipe Out Barrie Lead Twice

### NEW YEAR GAME

Barrie's revamped Colts won the approval of 500 hockey fans in the holiday game at the Arena Monday afternoon, playing against the junior "B" Kingsway Colts the local defenceless started the New Year with a bang-up display, scoring three of the four goals in the four-all draw.

Coach Tommy Thompson is fast molding a smooth machine out of the youthful material at hand. He had his kids passing the puck with abandon and only the work of the Kingsway defence kept Tyson from being another great shot. Much luck attended the pair as passes that would have placed Colts in the clear caught in skates or were deflected by sticks shoved full length on the ice in desperation.

A Fighting Team While the play was not as smooth as has been customary here, skating was just as fast, as the kids of both teams reared the ice lanes making bids for goals. Perhaps the most outstanding feature of the match was the spirit of the Barrie boys. They give promise of being one of the fightingest teams to wear the Colts uniform in many seasons.

Kingsway counted the first goal on one of the breaks that make hockey interesting. Fox carried the puck into the Barrie zone, passed to Gardner, who got himself lost in a maze of defenders, Southwell coming in to assist was taken out of the play toward a corner but carried the puck through on his skate and flipped it home at the 51st minute mark.

Two Quick Tallies Barrie opened up with that goal. They stormed in on Tyson but it was not evened until Paquette wound up at his own goal and kicked the puck into the net. Paquette's second goal came in the 59th minute when he carried the puck through the Kingsway defence for a try from close in. Just 30 seconds later Lindsay stickhandled to the defence, hesitated, weaved some more, appeared out of the play, picked up the puck again in close and rifled a shot to the lower right corner to send the Colts out in front.

At the 14-minute mark Chomysyn laid a beautiful pass on Paquette's stick in the Kingsway goal mouth and the third count was registered. Kingsway's goal came before the period ended at least three Barrie thrusts that should have resulted in goals were missed by Tyson turned them aside. The combination of Chomysyn and Bowen worked to place each in the clear but Tyson turned Chomysyn's stick to the net by fractions. At the 16-minute mark Morgan broke through on a gangling attack to end the scoring period.

Kingsway played short-handed twice during the frame as Southwell was wanted for cross-checking and interference but the local scores came when each team was at full strength. Lindsay got the goal for high sticking and while he was absent Coach Thompson tossed three of his first-year performers, Saunders, Dixon and Reynolds, over the boards and they made a good job of holding Kingsway away from Consaul's doorstep.

Edge For Visitors According to the vital statistics, Kingsway had a slight edge in the second period in shots on goals, Consaul's defence was a broken stoppage. With four minutes left in the period Gardner took Armstrong's pass to tie the score. Hayes and Bird, Reynolds, Goring and Saunders missed chances to send the Colts out in front when they faltered in pay dirt.

Just one minute after the third frame got under way Chomysyn made the play that put the Colts out in front again. Pete carried the puck into the Kingsway zone but was skated to the centre and dove-d. While on his back he flipped the puck to Bowen in front of the net and there was no mistake made as that set up.

Kingsway turned on a sustained drive that literally hemmed the Colts in their own end for minutes at a time. Consaul shed pucks in all directions but with three minutes left Bowler broke away with one man to beat and he did not leave anything to chance, nestling the puck in an upper corner to have the game end in a draw.

Consaul and Paquette were definitely the standouts of the Barrie team but every one of the others turned in a good game. Reynolds, Lindsay showed good goal-keeping, the rugged head of Allan and the floor of Kingsway's had man Southwell to win applause of the crowd. The forwards had plenty of tough luck but they were up against a hard band of back checkers that covered their men like blankets.

For Kingsway, Hanger on the defence and Tyson in goal, turned in near performances. Bowler and Morgan proved a pair of fast-breaking forwards that gave the Barrie netminder most trouble during the match.

Barrie Lions' entry in the Ontario Juvenile Hockey Association had their first workout Tuesday afternoon at the Arena. Manager Bill Garner announced that another practice would be held today at 4:15 and asked that all candidates for positions turn out as the first group game will likely be next week.

Lions are being coached by Tommy Thompson of the Colts. They have a seven-team group with Thornbury, Collingwood, Pennington, Midland, Coldwater and Wauwassee. A single schedule of home and home games will be played. This marks the first year the local juveniles have had group games, as otherwise they always played exhibition games and then went straight into the playdowns.

At Tuesday's practice almost every player from the church league was on hand, mostly midgets, and a lot of weeding out will be necessary. Very few of the regulars of last year's juveniles were on hand but all are expected today, including Fred Doherty and Roy Kirkpatrick, stalwart defencemen, Jackies Howard Buchanan and Jack Cook, forwards, Norm Cook and Doug King.

Goalie, sub goalie of the Colts, also Don Lewis, Bill Bell and Ray Hayes, are eligible for juvenile. Fin McGibbon, right winger for the juveniles last year, was out to practice Tuesday, also Howard Kelly and Ken Clute, who played some games last season. Ken LeGore, younger brother of Gary, was playing out in one of the nets. When Thompson gets all the available material, gets it sorted out and whipped into shape, he should have a juvenile team well able to give a good account of itself in the district group.

### COULSON PICKS UP STEAM LATER

(Owen Sound Sun-Times) Word from Syracuse is that Greg Coulsen, Collingwood Shipbuilder player of last season, who joined pro with the Syracuse Stars this season, has not been going so well to date, but it is hoped that he will shake his slump soon. District fans will recall that Coulsen, after a slow start with the Intermediate "A" team last year, was hitting a terrific clip as the season ended, and in the championship game with the Port Colborne Iceos, it was Coulsen who sank three goals behind the net and sent his team to victory with one of the best performances of the evening.

Coulsen, a Barrie boy, played juvenile hockey and then junior hockey with the champion Barrie Colts in the season of 1934-35, then went to the Eastern Amateur League in the United States, where he was a very valuable performer. Coulsen then returned to Canada to play with the Camp Borden Flyers for one season before going to Collingwood at the beginning of last season. Coulsen, on a line with Alvie Wilson, former Owen Sound Greys' player, and Ab Kirby, formed one of the best intermediate lines in the O.H.A. last season, and were the leading attackers in Collingwood's drive to the championship. Playing on right wing and being a left-hand shot did not seem to have any serious effect on Coulsen's playing as he patrolled the right boards in grand style.

One of Coulsen's admirers, who has seen many hockey players in action, remarked that "he had never seen a player wear a uniform so neat as the Collingwood forward." Other of the champion Shipbuilders who are not with the club this year are alternate defencemen, Ben Bill Allan, who is playing with the Port Colborne Sifters with Dick Tracey, Ab Kirby and Don Jeffrey are all playing in the senior O.H.A. in St. Catharines.
