MRS. J. E. EMMS (Dalton Correspondence) After a lingering illness, Mrs. J. E. Emms passed peacefully away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. R. Lee, Orillia, Monday, January 9, 1940. Born at Kingston, Ont., in 1842, Bertha Farrell was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Farrell, who later came and settled in Dalton, where she married J. E. Emms and they engaged in farming. Later they retired and lived in Barrie for ten years. Leaving Barrie they went to Orillia to reside with their daughter, Mrs. Emms was predeceased by one daughter (Effie) and also by her husband, ten years ago. Remaining to mourn her death are four daughters: Mrs. Abraham Jay (Leaur), Crown Hill, Mrs. John Jay (Leaur), Dalton; Mrs. Guy Van Meter (Mabel), Garden City, Mich.; and Mrs. Reinhold Lee (Clarence), Orillia.

MRS. R. J. LONG (The Herald, Peterborough, Ont.) Alice Hunter Long, beloved wife of R. J. Long, and for 17 years a resident of Peterborough, passed away suddenly Wednesday morning, December 27, 1939.

Mrs. Long was born Alice Hunter at Big Bay Point, Ontario, and spent most of her younger days in Barrie, Ontario. She graduated from De Mille College, at Oshawa, and trained for nursing at the Blessing Hospital at Quincy, Illinois.

The funeral was largely attended by many former Barrie people now residing in Ottawa. JOHN T. DOUGALL One of Barrie's oldest native-born residents passed away at his home, 115 Worsley Street, on Saturday evening, in the person of John Temple Dougall in his 80th year. In failing health since last summer, he had been confined to his bed for two months.

The funeral was held from his late residence to Barrie Union Cemetery, Tuesday afternoon, Rev. E. E. Long, minister of Collier St. United Church, conducted the service. The pallbearers were: S. W. OBITUARY CHARLES JONES Charles Jones, one of the earliest members of the 35th Regiment, predecessor of Grey and Simcoe Foresters, and former well known painter and decorator, passed away in Royal Victoria Hospital, Barrie, on Sunday, in his 92nd year. He had resided here for about 73 years.

In view of wartime conditions, it is interesting to recall that Mr. Jones was present at the original presentation of the colors to the 35th Regiment, which took place on May 25, 1860. He remembered the event very well because it was the day before his wedding.

Mr. Jones had enjoyed good health and was able to be around until Friday last, when he suffered a stroke. He had had a normal breakfast that day. Death occurred Sunday afternoon. The funeral was held from the residence of his son, William C. Jones, 19 Grove Street West, on Tuesday afternoon, with interment in Barrie Union Cemetery. It was under the auspices of Barrie Lodge, I.O.O.F., of which he had been a member for about 30 years.

The service was conducted by Rev. John McGillivuddy, pastor of First Baptist Church, assisted by Rev. N. R. D. Sinclair, minister of Essa Road Presbyterian Church, Allandale. The pallbearers were: W. McManus, W. D. Paddison, W. Clarke, Ed. Biggar, J. E. Marriott, and George Morris. Pallbearers, all brother Oddfellows of the deceased, were V. Geo. Morris, Amos Miller, W. D. Paddison, H. G. Robertson, W. J. McManus, and George Coles. Floral tributes included offerings from Barrie Lodge, I.O.O.F., and First Baptist Church. Born at Farnham, Surrey, England, on July 9, 1848, Mr. Jones came to Canada in 1867, the year of Confederation. A young man, he settled in Barrie and learned the trade of painter and decorator, in which he was well known and highly esteemed. On his retirement in 1927, the business was carried on by two sons, Walter and Philip Jones. On May 26, 1868, at the home of the groom's father, the late William Jones, which still stands on the west side of Bayfield Street, the second house south of Grove St., the marriage took place of Christina May, Rugby, to Charles Jones. They resided continuously in an attractive home at 42 Dalton St., built by Mr. Jones himself over 65 years ago, until her death in June, 1935. When built there was a dense bush north of Grove St. In 1935, they celebrated their 67th wedding anniversary. A modest, unassuming type of man, Mr. Jones was interested in his well kept lawns and gardens. Surviving are three sons: William, Walter and Philip Jones, Barrie; four grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren.
