ESSEX News Starting point of house fire atypical, chief says

Essex police and fire department personnel are investigating a fire Sept. 13 at 139 Talbot St. North.

Members of Essex Fire and Rescue were called to the scene at 11:41 p.m. and found the vacant house in flames. Chief Ed Pillon said the house was not completely destroyed by the fire.

"It wasn't completely damaged by the fire," Pillon said. "It is my understanding that the house was slated for demolition though."

The fire is being investigated, a routine procedure, although Pillon said some of the events of the fire are atypical. The chief said burn patterns indicate the fire likely started in the exterior of the home. He said there was no obvious indication of accelerants.

"There is an obvious burn pattern at the rear of the home," the chief said. "It appears as if the fire started there. Typically, house fires start in the interior and move out."

Pillon said Rick DiGioia, the owner of Super Quality Cleaners in Essex, owns the home. He said the police investigation has included a conversation with DiGioia. A determination of the cause of the fire will be made next week.

Recycling study ranks Windsor-Essex last

Essex County's poor recycling habits have some members of the Essex-Windsor Solid Waste Authority board calling for a long-term plan to improve rates.

"I think we've done a poor job with our education program," said Tecumseh Deputy Mayor Tom Burton Sept. 13. "I think people are confused with what goes in a Blue Box."

Last year, the area became one of seven municipalities in the province selected for study under Stewardship Ontario's Audit Program. One hundred households throughout Essex-Windsor were randomly selected to gauge the recycling practices of local residents. Of the seven municipalities, the area ranked last in successfully placing printed paper, plastics and glass into recycle boxes instead of trash bins.

"I don't think there's a lot of surprise in those numbers," said Leamington Deputy Mayor Rob Schmidt. "We, as a whole, have not done a good job of increasing our rates. Unless we take some serious steps as a group, we're not going to get a great change."

Schmidt called participation rates in the area "great," as the number of people who recycle is on the rise from about 70 to 80 percent.

He says the problem is that people are not composting or putting acceptable materials into the recycle box.

Leamington's four garbage bag-per-household limit should serve as a model across Windsor-Essex, Schmidt said.

Windsor Ward 1 Councillor Joyce Zuk said when the new board is created following the Nov. 13 municipal election one of its first considerations should be "continuity across the region."

But for EWSWA General Manager Todd Pepper, a study of 100 local households is not necessarily an accurate reflection of the recycling practices in the region.


In a written memo to the board, Pepper pointed out, "... a sample size of 100 households, out of the total number of over 158,000 households served by the authority's recycling program, would not normally be considered statistically significant."
