

## **Tiger star rode the rails to the World Series**

As the World Series gets underway for the Detroit Tigers and the St. Louis Cardinals, we thought our readers might enjoy this piece by Bill Gay, which originally ran Feb. 22, 2006.

When the annual Essex Model and Toy Train Show rolls around each year, images of railway history come into sharper focus. This story involves the greatest Tiger of them all -Ty Cobb – and a young Essex boy named Don

pleted a late season series with their archrivals, the Cleveland Indians, in the Forest City. Leaving the

Tigers hotel, Ty Cobb was accosted by a fan who had too much to drink and demanded an autograph. Instead of signing, the illtempered Detroit star decked the man, jumped in a cab and left for the train station. The fan ran to the police, who were more than happy to drag Cobb off to jail if they could. A Cleveland judge issued an arrest warrant but before they could act, the Tiger's train was back across the

state line into Michigan. But the warrant stood.

Winning the 1909 pennant, Detroit was to meet Pittsburgh in the World Series. But how to get the Tiger outfielder there when the path to the away games led through Ohio? The Tigers shipped Cobb quietly on another route - the Michigan Central line through Essex and eastward to Buffalo, thence to Pittsburgh.

According to baseball lore, Cobb got off the train on the platform that still is part of the Essex Railway Station. He was met by Don Murray, a young Essex lad, who told me many

years later that he was awakened as he slept in his parents' home near the station when the nitroglycerine explosion of 1907 occurred. But on that October day two years later, Don got to meet a baseball legend, if only for a few moments, right in Essex.

Despite the Tigers' best efforts in getting their star player to the games in Pittsburgh, the Georgia Peach hit only .231 in the World Series after batting a stellar .377 during the regular season. The Bengals bowed to the Pirates in seven games.
