Regarding a new arena in Essex, Inverarity says everything has changed now that there are plans for Tecumseh's Ice Track. If a new facility in Essex does go through, Inverarity says he doesn't think anyone in Ward 3 should pay for it in taxes.

He is also concerned about cleaning up the discharge in septic tanks leaking into Lake Erie. He sug-

cial, residential and industrial growth within the community to increase the tax base.

"It will be growth in a controlled fashion that will meet the needs of existing residents and create jobs for young people," he said.

In rural Ward 3, there's not much for young people to do without driving into an urban centre, Rogers said.

He considers a good business sense to be one of his strengths. He has a history in production and sales in the

years.

He is also concerned about the safety of certain roads in the south end.

"Some roads are dangerous," he said. "When it rains, there are ruts that fill up and cause cars to hydroplane. We've got to take care of our roads."

Innes would also like to see the municipality's two urban centres of Essex and Harrow be revitalized.

"It's money well spent when we put up flowers and clean the streets," he said.

He is also in favour of building a new arena. He compares it to the improvements made to the Harrow Community Room, and says they have helped to bring the community together.

"The arena is going to make a big difference," he said.

During his time in council, Dufour has served on several committees, including the finance committee and the Essex-Windsor Solid Waste Authority.

gests extensive repairs or putting in new sewers to run between the Arner Townline and Erie Street in the south end of the municipality.

With Ontario's Clean Water Act introduced last month, Inverarity hopes to secure provincial funding for the project.

"There are too many days in the summer when the lake is closed due to bacteria," he said.

Letting people know Lake Erie is a safe place to swim is important for the redevelopment of Colchester, he added.

In the next term, Rogers would like to see council create a better cohesiveness within the community.

"We've got to start working as a unit," he said. "It's a sentiment of my residents in Ward 3 that it is a forgotten area."

Rogers, who's lived in Colchester since 1978, said the area is a unique part of the county.

"I've watched Ward 1 begin to degrade," he said. "We've got to be more supportive of entrepreneurs."

In Ward 3, residents haven't been properly represented, Innes said. It's a concern he's hearing while

campaigning door to door. He said there is a need for more attention and development in the ward.


