Brummell said the new distribution port will service about 200 stores in Manitoba and Saskatchewan, providing a variety of products including dog food, cat food and bird seed. Brummell said the products will mostly be available at larger stores like Pet Smart.

Topcrop has partnered with a number of other busi-



nesses in the venture. including Royal Canin, Kaytee, Coastal Pet Products and Ranger Metal

Products, Pet Safe, Pestell Pet Products, Ethical and Woodstream. Currently, there are three

other Topcrop locations; two in Essex and another in Colbourne, Ont., east of Toronto.

The Windsor-Essex County Development Commission introduced their new Chief Executive Officer, Matthew Fischer, to local politicians and business people last Saturday at a community breakfast held at Lakeside Produce in Leamington.

Ontario Vegetable Growers Essex

Association followed with a fact-filled presentation on the growth of the local greenhouse industry, which includes 1,400 acres in County and

Chatham-Kent.

In Essex County, tomatoes, peppers and cucumbers make up 90 per cent of the crop and flowers 10 per cent. Greenhouses generate about \$3.9 billion in economic activity. Ontario's greenhouse agriculture represents over half of Canada's total and is the largest greenhouse sector in North America. Learnington alone has the largest area "under glass" in North America.

In the summer, the greenhouse operators use natural gas to create carbon dioxide to spur plant growth. Electricity is created as a by-product, which the industry hopes to sell into the power grid to help alleviate warm weather shortages. If you have your own business, you can reduce your taxes by hiring family members.

A good rule of thumb is to pay them what you would have paid a third party for the same services. Keep a record of the time spent and the services actually performed."

Tax deductions for self-employed

ʻIf you are selfemployed, make sure you know about all of the available tax benefits," says Chartered Accountant Gary Kopstick, Senior Tax Partner, Soberman LLP in Toronto.

"For example, if you operate out of two offices, including one in the home, the costs related to the home office may not be deductible. In addition, only 50 per cent of meals and entertainment expenses

you incur for the business are deductible.

"You may also deduct a portion of Canada Pension Plan (CPP) contributions that represent the employer's share to a maximum of \$1,910.70 for 2006."
