

Point Pelee revisited

Author Henrietta O'Neill has a passion for Point Pelee National Park.

In 2000, O'Neill wrote "In Search of a Heart", a history commissioned by the Friends of Point Pelee. A limited number of books were printed but this well written history of Canada's most southerly point on the mainland is still available at stores in the Point Pelee area.

In "In Search of a Heart", O'Neill weaves the early days of the area flawlessly with information gained through extensive interviews and secondary sources.

Last November, O'Neill's newest work – "Birding at Point Pelee, a Birder's History of one of Canada's Most Famous Birding Spots" – was published. The new book is the story of a century of change in extreme southern Essex County.

With the May birding season just around the corner, O'Neill's latest effort is a must-read for serious and casual birders alike.
