
## Harness **Highlights**

Last Sunday, Unique Sam was first to the finish line in a claiming pace for ownerdriver Pat Barr of Essex. Lightly regarded at the mutuels, Unique Sam paid \$22 to win.

Mike Micallef leads the drivers' parade so far this season at Windsor. He has 76 wins. Al Cullen is second with 70 and Jason Brewerdriven horses have been first to stop the teletimer 62 times. Essex teamster Gene Piroski has 27 victories, and earnings of \$118,982.
